CRATER MYSTERY STRIKES IN U.S.

Baton Rouge, Louisiana - April 6, 1964 - (LS) - A number of unidentified objects came crashing from the sky onto Baton Rouge on the night of April 6th. One object reportedly left a two foot crater at the point of impact. There were no reports of injuries. An earlier report from January 17th states that an object crashed and burned a lawn in Benbrook, Texas. Scientists at TCU ruled out the possibility of a meteorite in the earlier case. (SOURCE: Ft. NEW RADIO TAPE TO BE AIRED

Atlanta, Georgia - April 7, 1964 - (LS) - As mentioned in an earlier issue, a new documentary tape of the UFO story has been made by Station WBT in Charlotte, N.C. WBT is the 3rd oldest radio station in the country. This outstanding tape is available for rebroadcast by other stations at no charge. It is one hour long, and includes interviews with Riley Crabb, head of the Borderland Sciences Research Associates (BSRA), and Bryant Reeves, co-author of FLYING SAUCER PILGRIMAGE. This tape is scheduled for re-broadcast at the Congress of Scientific UFOlogists on June 20th. One radio station, WIS of Columbia, S.C., has already rebroadcast the tape. ON LOOK-SEE =..I believe this is a step in the right direction, though I feel it could be expanded with reports from all groups together six times a year. As a private researcher and investigator in Pennsylvania now, I would be glad to add my contribution to this cause. -- George D. Fawcett, Director of Public Relations, Advisory Board Member, Mass. & R.I. Two-State UFO Study Group for Adults.

UNITY IN UFOLOGY = I do not think it proper for a group to ally itself with another without the consent of its membership, or some type of guarantee that the merger will work out for the betterment of both organizations. -- Eugene R. Steinberg, Director, Aerial Phenomena Investigation Committee.

UFO INVESTIGATIONS:....I feel that improvement in quality of investigations is the most crucial need...UFOs have been in the public eye since 1947; their mystery is not solved. The current "investigations" hardly inspire confidence... with a few happy exceptions, most civilian "investigators" are children throwing mudpies at each other. I believe the AF "investigators" are totally apathetic. -- David Halperin, Director, New Jersey Association of Aerial Phenomena.

LOOK-SEE (2): = The reason Look-See is not published regularly is the failure of member-groups to participate. Although sightings are not enough for a publication, an opportunity to collect a file of them should be given. With a file full of good sightings, no one can dispute you. If all groups (would) send sightings, a vast knowledge would be accumulated. -- Keith Jenkins, Secretary-Treasurer, Flying Saucer Research Organization.

UNITY IF UFOLOGY (2) I doubt that it'll work, although there is little doubt in my mind that if all the gogoboo seeking people who have jumped into this field to publish little 'zines and make a big noise had, instead, put their cash wholeheartedly behind NICAP we'd be a helluva lot further along in getting this thing out into the open. -- George W. GLOWING MONSTER JUST A BUTANE TANK, BUT OTHERS???

Portales, New Mexico - May 2, 1964 - (LS) - A wave of "saucer fever" may be sweeping through the state of New Mexico. The Air Force has apparently felt obliged to release a new debunking statement to the press as it began investigations of a "new epidemic of strange sightings" in that area. Dr. J. Allen Hynek, Air Force contract scientist in UFO Investigations, was sent to Socorro, N.M., to look into the matter. A recent report made in Portales, N.M., of a 12 foot glowing white object hovering just above the ground sent police speeding to the scene. The object, UPI reports, was only a "freshly painted butane tank." We have, for no known reason, not been receiving the legitimate sighting reports from this area. (SOURCES: AP-UPI).

AF LISTS 15 UNKNOWN FOR '63

Washington, D.C. - April 30, 1964 - (LS) - The AF says that after investigating more than 8,000 UFO reports in 16 years, it is "yet to discover any evidence that UFOs represent a threat" to security. Over the 16 year period, 7.7% of the cases could not, even after investigations, be identified by any conventional means. This is over 600 reports; however, the Air Force totals for 1963 indicate that it may be true that people who sight UFOs may not be going to AF authorities with their reports. The AF lists a total of 382 cases for 1963. Some private groups may have gotten considerably more than this number. An Associated Press report states that of these 382 reports, 15 are still listed as unidentified. (SOURCE: AP-AMUFO).
