Date: April 2, 1981
Time: 4:45 A.M.
Duration: 30 minutes
Location: Kitchener, Waterloo, Brantford area
The Waterloo Regional Police Detachment called me at 5:15 A.M. to report sightings of two unidentified cloud like objects. These two cloud like objects were red in color and in the eastern portion of the sky. One "cloud" was above the other "cloud". These "clouds" were circular in shape. The highest cloud was the size of a $50 \phi$ piece held at arm's length and the cloud beneath it was the size of a nickle held at arm's length. They were at an elevation of $45^{\circ}$. Brantford and Mount Forest OPP were also calling in reporting these strange red clouds.

The sky was completely clear, with the exception of these two unusual red clouds, temperature was $2^{\circ} \mathrm{C}$.

When the officers started radioing in to the OPP headquarters on Frederick St. in Kitchener concerning this sighting, about 12 officers at the station opened the windows and also viewed the cloud like objects. One of the officers then called me. While we were discussing the sighting, the objects faded from view.

Comments:
I called Cliff Cunningham (astronomer) and nothing astronomical fit the above description. But the correct explanation follows. When Cliff arrived at the K-W Record Newspaper at 7:30 A.M., a wire service report had come in at 6:31 A.M. from Washington. The report is as follows:
"Red, green and bluish lights seen high in the sky in the eastern U.S. before dawn came from a research rocket launched by NASA. NASA said clouds rleased from the rocket launched at 4:48 A.M. eastern standard tire from its! Virginia station were seen as far north as N.Y. and as far south as Huntsville, Alabama. An experiemnt was conducted by scientits, studying winds and electrical fields, in the upper atmosphere. NASA said the clouds are harmless and should have negligible effect on the environment."


Date: April 8, 1981
Time: 7:40 P.M.
Duration: 20 minutes
Location: Gordon St., Cambridge
Witness noticed an unusually bright light in the sky, while looking out her window. The light was due south and looked like a figure eight on its' side. The elevation was $35^{\circ}$, distance away she could not ascertain. She retrieved her binoculars and then viewed the light. At this point she could see two huge separate lights. The total size of the lights was that of a street lamp. One light was straight on and the other was slightly to the side, but the witness thought they were attached to only one object. The lights were extremely bright and hard to look at through binoculars. She called her husband and he too watched the lights. They viewed for 5 minutes. A large plane approached from the west and flew between them and the lights. The lights flickered slightly and then went out, one going :Jut momentarily before the other. The lights stayed off until the plane nassed over to the other horizon, which took 2 to 3 minutes. The lights then flickered slightly and came on again. The witness then telephoned her mother to view the lights. They viewed the lights for another 15 minutes. The lights cast a brilliant ray out , almost like a search light effect. Two other planes approached, one small plane from the north west and one large plane from the south west. They both flew between the lights and the witnesses, but at a considerable distance away from the lights. The lights again blinked out and remained out. They looked periodically, but never saw the lights again. The lights remained stationary during the total sighting. Temperature was $55^{\circ}$ F, sky clear, stars visible.

## Comments:

Through process of elimination, nothing man made nor astronomical fits into the above description.

Conclusion: Unidentified noctural light.

The majority of people reading this newsletter will have read Wendelle Stevens book "UFO Contact from the Pleiades", or have heard about this particular case of a Swiss citizen having many contacts with aliens. Kal Korff conducted a long investigation into this case and this expose was presented in Gil Ziemba's "The New National UFO Newsletter", Issue No. I and Issue No. 2. I wrote Kal and Gil a letter, requested permission to include this article in my newsletter, of which permission was kindly granted. Kal mentioned the fact that the article is actually the first chapter (condensed) of his book on the case. The article follows.

INTODUCTION - According to the book UFO. Contact rom The Pleiaces, a Swiss citizen named iduard "Billy" Deier has had over 130 contacts with aliens, recorded over 3,000 pares of quotes from thea, and has taken hundreds of clear pictures of their crart. He has also been riven rock and metal samples which, accordinc to his story, dery conventional explanation. The book goes on to state that an investiçation conducted brivendelle Stevens, Thous !elch, Britt-Milsson-Slders, and Lee Elders, has shown all of reier's claims to be renuine.

If the events described above were truly factual, it would certainly be one of the most remarkable occurrences the world has ever seen. Unfortunately, as we shall discover, none $=0$ the purported events appears able to withstand careiul scientific scrutiny.
THE EMSRIENCES - THE CLAINS - According to the book, leier's inst experience with extraterrestrials beşan on Januarr 23, 1975. However, accordjng to articles writien by Vendelle Sievens and published in the now defunct Argosy UFO, dated I:arch 1977 and lay 1977, Neicr's first sighting of $\overline{Q_{1} U R O}$ occurred on June 2, 1942 while he was only five years of ace. Subsequentl\%, Ieien has al.so clained $\because$ that durin\% that same jear, he was invited to take a ride on a pear-shaped U:iO by a "very old man."

Accordinf: to press releases desjened to help prowote the book's saje, Jin Lorenzen, Directon of the Aerial Pheno:nena Research Or:anization, supposedly endorsed the bool as beine a fenuine representation or the facts. Accordinct to ir. Jorenzen, this is not so. Lorenzen went on to describe the statenent as a "partial quote, taken out of context," and went on to sar that be considered the i.eier pbotormaphs to be "art", not science.?
?endelle C. Stevens, a one-forth partner in Genesis III Productions which published the boon, sers reier's sought no publicity fo:s anyone concerning his allesed experjences. Yet jut is documented that feier intomed !r. Uilfried ralk of fannhein, Jest Geriany, that he planned to write a book about his eaperjences as earl: as 1977. Also, according to Jin Lorenzen, Sevens once described ieier to hjirlas "a sort person who eves reat satisfaction out o\% foolinç authorities."

The book alleges that sone of reier's pictures were analyzed by couputer and shown to be authentic, and implies that De Anza Sijstems of San Jose, California, did some of the analisis of the l'eier photographs.

A check with rr. Warne Heppier the nanaerer for De Anza Systers, produced a cateテorical denial that an analvisis was ever done.
"Where was no analysis performed - what we did was sone enHancinc to halu certain parts of the picture stand out." exclained ITappier.
'So did \%our firin do an analysis?'
"ĩo." replied Happier.
"But the book implies that rou did, and furthemore it claims that via computer analrsis the rieier photorraphs were shown to be authentic," I stated.
"That is sambace!" replied Heppler. "Look, what these euys did, was come on down to De Anza Systeas claining that they wanted to buy a couputer from us. So we took one of their pictures, one showinc the URO, and enhanced it to nale ceriain parts of the picture stand out. mhen ther took pictures of it, left, and stated that ther would ret back in touch with us. And we havn't heard roin then since." exclained Happler

I then asked Happler if De Anza Srsteis had the technjcal capabilities to do such an analusis and lie replied: "ITo. We are in no position to do an analusis."

Zinally, I asked Heppler who the men were who had visited De Anza Sustens. He informed ue that it was Jin Dilettoso and Thomas Velch. Heppler also said he knew of Wendelle Stevens.

In an as uet unpublished paper, !endelle Stevens states that a thorouch analusis of several of the lejer photos was conducted by Neil Davis of Desiôn fechnolo~y in Poway, California. A further check with Design Pechnolow brousht the inforiation that their anal sis had bo means been conclusive, and that ity certainly did not prove the validity oi the reier photorraphs.

Another claik made in the book UC.. Contact rion Mhe Pleiades is that ieier once photorraphed a Swiss fighter attackin a UnO. Yet, within the nhoto jraph jtsel?, there is no visible evidence
 aitention, Genesis III clained that the pilot did not see the UIO, but that it had nerel: been tracked on radar. Ir this were the case, one wonders how the pilot could possjbly have attacked somethjen that be was unable to see? Also, i: one relies on a strictly cursor examination of the photorapl in question, it will be noted that the UO appears to be fly in: too low to have been picked up on radar!

The book oes on to say that there were man witnesses to the evonts described by lejer. Yet the boo? ails to oive any

Another or leier's interesting clains is that the aliens informed hin that the oricinated from the star-syste: of "the Pleiades." nhis on its surface is illofical, since the tera "Pleiades," is an Earth-teril for that particular clusters of stars. It would be a tremendous coincidence indeed i? the Tiliens" also called their howe star-system by the same name. Bven more danning however is that the pleiades are only some tens of ilillions of vears old, and thus still relatively unforied stars. Accordinct to astronowers, ther are neither old enourth nor stable enough to have formed planets capable of supporting lixe. In fact, their cenerall of these stars that appears in the boolr!

It is alleged that over 3,000 pases of notes were taken by leier durinf his encounters, and that the aliens cave reier the Host sount after prize of all - wisdoin. In this were the case it appears to have been very basic wisdon indeed, since all of the supposed quotes are of a pseudorrelisious nature, while advocating a belief in reincarnation and pantheisw.

Dr. James Hurtak, a lancuase specialist who has read most of Meier's writings in the original gerilan, had this to sar about theia:
"As an aside, I have had the opportunity to read large portions of the Seujase correspondence (sowe eleven volums of German inaterial via lieier). Troin the standpoint of 'higher criticisn' --. the linguistic use or Érotain-Aranaic and Eutrptian-Hebrew names (oî divinities) and stylistic affinities -- is 'latter daú patchworle.'
"All this shifting play of correspondences by which everything, as it were, is cheated of its individual logic creates a mood or pensive jestinj, spirited illusions, and even subline travesty. Bry all standards of genuine 'ancient knowledȩe' (e. J. . ) Eorptoló, Senitics, etc.) -- this civilization whjch lays clain to beine 5,000 years into the future -- has not oftered wuch in the way on a quantum junp over what our ancestors had five thousand years ajo, (in the way of intellectual transformation)."

In addition, the "qalmud Imanuel," clained breier to be the true New Testament hidden until recentlo, proved to be nothing more than Luther's version of the New Testament with added passages exhibiting the sane stwle as the Semjase inanuscripi (ieier's allefed space "source") and contained exactlr the same stylistic erions characteristic of Ir. Pejer's terman!

The book claims that leier's canera has been jamed at infinitr for several rears, which hampered the rocus on soile of the photocrapis. Since this appears to bave been the case, and if leier did experience over 130 contacts wit? aljems as clained, then one wonders wher never bothered to get bis camera repajred, so that he could have taken clear sharp pictures oi these "remarlable" events. Even more curious, however, is the apparent tntal ignorance of Stevens, Elders, Helch, et. al (who mind ou, are supposedly "highly connetent" investiçators) as to evon the most basic principles o\% canera operation, Pven presurnethat the ocis oneiers canema is "iamed just short
or infinity＂；virtually any camera clerk in the countre knows that because of the depth of field characteristics inherent in all canera optics，（regardless of the make or model or the camera involved）a photorraph of any obiect located between five or six feet froin the canera and infinity（which in canera teriu－ inolofy ineans anthing over ifte eet awa＂）will still be in perfect $\hat{O}$ ocus in an normal dayliont exposure．Onl objects closer than five on six eet depth of field linit will appear fuzzJ and out－of－iocus，with the fuzzjess increasing the nearer the object is to the camera！

This act alone would seen to be a very serious law in the Genesis IIJ research，and cast serious doubt on the possible authenticity of the deier photo＇s．

Concernine phrisical evidence，the book qoes on to say that the Pleiadean＂cosionauts＂gave reier sone crrestals which weie unique，and not senerall：known to Earth teminolog．In addition to these，ieier was also Given four netal samples，and one bjo－ losical sample．

I spoke with Dr．Warcel Vogel，a scientist who conducted a series of tests ch the leies samples and whose opinion of them totallü contradicts what the book clains．farcel inorned me that onl＂the first sample was unique．It consisted of alunum， silver，and thalinn，with each of the three elenents havinc a hirh degree of purit．The other samples were round to be ordin－ ary crystals consisting or quartz，citrine，anetbrst and silver solder，none of：which proved to be of extraterrestrial orícin， and the do not substantiate the clai＂．made in the book．

Burthermore，varcel also informed we that the two photos that appear in UOO．．Contact Rron The Pleiades that purport to show the ieier samples under extrene hachifation，in fact do not show then at all．Accordine to rarcel，the photocraphs were part of an analusis project at IBI（where rarcel is emplowed as a Cheinst）and that tendelloptevens acquised the photos bri stealing them from his home！stevens，of course，has denied this，but 良 has also refused to coment as to where the photo＇s came rron．

COMPUTER ANALYSIS OT MEIER'S PHOTOGRIPHS - First generation copies of ten of Meier's iore popularly known photographs, three of which appear in the book, were forwarded to Ground Saucer Watch Inc., in Phoenix, Arizona, for coiputer analysis.

The following modes of conputer enhancenent were utilized:

+ Edge Enhancwirnt
+ Color Contouring
+ Fixel (picture cell) Distortion Test
+ Digitizing

It is the opinion of the entire GSW photographic staff, that "All of the pictures are hoaxes and should not be considered evidence of an extraordinary flying craft."

1) Most of the analyzed photographs are extrerely light (insufficient density) above the UFO image. This tends to mask any supportive structures above the UFO.
2) The UFO iriages are out-of-focus when compared to other features of conparable distances fron the camera. This is indicative of the UFO being close to the canera.
3) Utilizing the canera lens size (42mm) and the focal length of the camera, all calculations place the UFO inages at distances between four and six feet (1.2 to 1.8 neters) from the canera.
4) Atnospheric effects on distance. features in the pictures is not noticeable on any of the UFO inages. This indicates that the UFO's are positioned at a close point to the canera.
5) Shadows on the UFO's and the foreground/background features do not correlate.
6) The three types of hoax photography utilized were:
a) A suspended model with a string.
b) The double exposure technique.
c) The double print nethod.

For specific criticisris of Meier's photographs, let us carefully exarine each one of the pictures individually.

Meier reported that the large tree in the foreground of one picture is 156 feet ( 46.6 meters) from the camera. Conputer analysis reveals that the UFO is in front of the tree. The branches have been interpreted to be behind the UFO. The density (grey value) of the shadow (bctton) portion of the UFO varies appreciably froi. features in the tree. Measuring the angle of the sun as it strikes the trees and comparing it to the UFO, it is easy to observe the difference.

There is photographic evidence to suggest usage of the double print technique. The double print technique consists of two negatives, one of the UFO model and the other of an outdoors scene. Then you place both negatives in the enlarger and print the picture. The UFO nodel is close to the car.era.

Computer digitizing scan of the edges of the UFO and foreground features in another picture revoals that the UFO is in the same plane. Pixel (picture cell) displacement reveals a smooth edge on the UFO with a uniform density, which is indicative of closeness to the careera. There is evidence above the UFO of a linear structure, representing a supportive device (i.e., string or wire).

In the photograph shown with this article, one can note the obvious supportive string or wire above the UFO revealed under edge cnhancement processing. Sizing of known features indicates a rodel with dimensions of less than eight inches (203 min) in diameter. Also there are discrepancies with regard to the shadows on
the UFO.

Photographic analysis of six additional pictures has revealed similar serious discrepances and evidence of fakery.

## GENERAL COMPUTER EVALUATION NOTES

1) There is evidence of total misrepresentation in Genesis's own computer analysis, especially when the terns "thermogran" and "z-scale contour" are used. They are simply color contouring with pseudo-density slicing and do not represent any type of light distortion properties.
(Pseudo-density slicing operates by taking a false or synthetic color, of which the GSW system has over 64, and electronically applying it to the grey value of the photograph. It subsequently produces a black matrix on the photograph so that a definite slicing can take place to study the individual area densities of the photographs.)
2) Color contouring analysis reveals shadow discrepancies in many of the photographs.
3) Three sinilar, yet different sized models were used in the thirty different franes that were interpreted.
4) The size $O$ i the UFO nodels ranged fron eight to twelve inches in dianeter.
5) Supportive structures were found in three of the photographs.
6) In all cascs, the model of the UFO was extremely sharp in the pixel (picture cell) analysis, indicating extrene closeness to the camera. Conversely, other mid and far background inages were fuzzy in the picture cell analysis due to atiospherics affecting the inages, indicating true distance fron the canera.
7) Computer enhancement reveals copying technique flaws, i.e., placerant (location) Uistakes, therefore, the UFO "appears" to be in front of the tree instead of behind the tree, (secondary flares that would not be apparent in a "normal" exposed photograph)

Ground Saucer Watch finally concluded that: "It is our opinion that all of the analyzed photographs are hoaxes, both crude and grandiose, and that they should not be considered evidence of an extraordinary flying craft. All of the evaluated franes can be duplicated with a basic camera and darkroon equipment ..... the incidents are an updated, 1980 version of the George Adaraski clains of detailed photographs and contacteeisn with space people."

It appears that much of the scientific verbiage in the Meier book cane from a symposium conducted by the Society of Photo-Instrurent Engineers of which Jirn Dilettoso attended. Dilettoso later contacted lany of the individuals who presented papers on inage processing.

Dilettoso also attended the last four GSW public lectures held in Phoenix. His purpose was to inquire about corputer photographic analysis: After he learned that GSW had rejected the Meier photographs in 1978, (six to eight months after their initial investigation), Dilettoso nodified his approach and started to inquire on conputer enhancenent laboratories. Dilettoso contacted four laboratories under the guise of purchasing equipnent and/or their services.

## GENERAL COMMENTS ON OTHER MEIER PHOTOGRAPHS

One thing that immediately becones noticeable is the fact that the botto: portions of the UFO's in Meier's photographs are always dark, as would be the case if the objects in question were snall models at a fairly close distance from the camera. If the objects were of an appreciable size; say 20-30 feet in dianeter, the bottons of the craft would not be as dark as they are. This is an obvious point, visible to the naked eye. Another point that the book dosn't mention, is the fact that most of the photographs have been retoushed and made to look "betiter. atory in Switzerland!

Also, the photographs which shows the UFO in front of the two log piles is a cropped down version of the original. Curiously, when the original uncropped photograph is examined, there is a distinct lack of a ground shadow on the hill below the objectwhere, under nori.al circuristances, one would readily expect to find one! ience, it appears that the photograph was faked hy superimposing the UFO onto another picture showing the two log piles in the background. This photograph can be seen on the cover as well as inside the book UFO... Contact Fror: The Pleiacies.

In one particular sequence of Meier's photographs, a UFO appears to be circling a tree. Although Genesis III clains that the entire sequence was taken in a period of a few seconds, a close exai ination of the changing cloud patterns in the background actually indicates that the pictures rust have been taken over a wuch longer period of tire --- certainly far longer than the few seconds ascribed to the incident by boti Meier and Genesis III.

Genesis III counter explanation that "clouds change quickly in that area" falls flat when one checks the weather report of the day in question and dispovers that the winds were only blowing at fifteen viles an hour!

Further exanination of this sequence turns up evidence that the UFO penetrates the limbs of the tree, as if the UFO were resting on its branches. Even wore startling, however, is that when the original site was visited, there was no sisn of a tree ever having been there! Based on these findings, it must be concluded that both the tree and the UFO were cleverly superimosed onto photographs showing nothing but $a$ normal cloudy cveracast day. SUBSEQUENT CLAIPIS - Not crily are Meier's experiences said to be continuing to this very day, but to bring the reaier un-co-date on his latest adventures, Genesis III is planning the releast of TFW... Contact Frow The Pleiades Volurm İ. Exavely when it will Ee ruluased however is still inknown.

In addition to the clains already mentioned, Meier has also stated that he has travelled back into tine and met with Jesus Christ. Jesus, as the story goes, was so pleased with Meier, that he appointed hirn as one of his disciples. Meier however, clains that he returned back to this day and age to avoid being crucified!

Meier also clains to have visited other planets, to have travelled in time to both the past and the future, and to have taken close range photographs of the Apollo-Soyus space capsule link-up in 1975, prehistoric pterodactyls, San Francisco sinking into the bay after a major earthquake, and even one of God's Eyes. (Curiously, when asked why he didn't photograph both of God's eyes, Meier replied that it wasn't possible since the other eye was winking at his Pleiadean carnpanion --- Senjase!)
SUMMARY AND CONCLUSION - After a careful review of all of the major purported events as stated by Genesis III and those individuals involved with the Meier case, it can be conclusively showill that none of the events as claireed, contain the slightest shred of evidence to support their authenticity. Therefore, it nust be stated that the Meier case gives every appearence of being nothing more than a grandiose and elaborate hoax. It is certainly per= hacs, the most extravagant of all the known contactee cases contained within the records of Ufology.

Perhaps Wendelle Stevens in a letter to Jir: Lorenzen put it best: "As you well know, Jir, the book was never disigned to present any hard facts..."

Mr. Elders:

I am in receipt of a copy of your letter of 26th August to Mr. David Elrich of UFO Report concerning my review of the film UFOs Are Real and specifically concerning certain opinions $I$ voiced therein about the Edouard "Billy" Meier UFO contactee case. I sincerely bope that this letter will serve to clarify my feelings on this matter.
"What evidence", you ask, leads me to the "'almost certain' conclusion that the case is a hoax? The sad truth is that the merit of the Meier case rises and falls on no other evidence than that which you yourselves have provided, not only in the form of published material and "test results", but more importantly in the form of method--the very way you and your fellow "investigators" have gone about offering up your so-called "evidence". Your seemingly deliberate suppression of potentially damning bits of information (ihere in your book do you mention the God's eye, pterodactyl, San Francisco earthquake-time travel photos; Heier 's supposed trips to Saturn; his alleged witnessing of the Apollo-Soyuz linkup; or his claim to be the l3th disciple of Christ, for example?) is in itself enough to make your case highly suspicious in the eyes of anyone bright enough to look beyond the glossy pages of Pleiades. Even worse is your somewhat shockingly persistent record of what could almost be described as a paranoid reaction to any form of criticism. First you boil the evidence, being careful to pick and choose for publication only those pieces which tend to support your thesis, and then when someone comes along with an embarrassing question or a conciusion you fail to agree with, you immediately feign horror and self-righteous indignation. "What evidence could they have possibly seen that would lead them to such an unfavorable conclusion?", you wonder.

Isn't it curious that only those who seem to have made a direct financial investment in lleier and his curious claims are strong proponents of the case? Virtually every major UFOlosist in the country has condemned it. Friedman, Lorenzen, Andrss, Hynek, von Keviczky, Hendry Spaulding, Oberg, Clark, even my associate Charles Berlitz- not a single one will stank behind $\because$ eier. A remarkable show of unity for a group that so frequently agrees to disagree on so many other controversial cases. そrofessional jealousy? i.efarious plot? Coincidence? ...or just plain lack of credibility on Meier's (and, by association, your own) part? $\because$ ost of the above named individuals I have known, either on a professional or friendly basis, for some time. I have come to respect their collective (if not always their individual) judeements. When the concensus of such a group is that a case is most likely a fraud, I must place a groat weight upon such a judgement.

Equally (you will forfive me) I personally find it somewhat offensive to have someone offer me $\$ 25$ proof-positive of UFO contact from the Pleiades only to discover that the "proof" that was supposed to have been in volume I has been withheld pending the publication of a second, equally expensive, volume (and what guarantee against a third or even a fourth and fifth...ad nauseum?). Now don't get me wrong. I have absolutely no objection to anyone earning an honest profit and a fair return on their investments. There is however a line....

Another thing that weighs heavily afainst you is your curious penchant for making recurrent threats to take legal action against those who question the validity of Pleiades. I know of at least four individuals other than myself who have been the recipients of such veiled hints at legalistic reprisal. Case in point: Your recent threat, through a Phoenix attorney, against Colman von Keviczky. Irterestingly however, rather than refute his anti-ifeier claims directly on a point-by-point basis, you choose instead to launch a cheap attack against him on copyright grounds. Again, the profit motive and fear of exposure overshadows any desire to see all sides of the issue aired freely. If Colman's conclusions about Meier are as false and untenable as you would have us believe, then you should be overjoyed that he chooses to publish them- all the better to enable you to strengthen your case. You can't possibly expect anyone to believe that the few dollars profit he mirht make from the sale of his slides is what worries you. At 333 ner set, how many sets do you suppose he will vedile? Ten? Tweity? Even if he peddles a hundred, it's still hardly worth a court case. I suspect what you're really worried about is that Colman misht pedde a set to someone who will know how to use them arainst you. Not so? All of which, of course, leaves scientific method by the wayside- a God convenient enough for lip service, but anparently unworthy of serious worship.

And what about jour recent proclivities with lir. Kal Korff of Eremont California? Is it not true that one of your group recently offered to provide him with access to any and all of your "evidence" that he might see fit to reouest, but with the proviso that he first agree not to discuss the results of his findings with anyone except representatives of cenesis III? Is this your idea of open-minded scientific examination of-the evidence, or just another attempt to shut off the onposition?

I am sure you are aware that there are those who suggest that your
 purpose of exploiting his Air Force credentials in an attempt to lend some degree of credibility to your operation. While this may or may not be the case, one very interosting point comes to light in all of this. If indeed the frier case is truly the most exciting event you portray it to be, and if the weisht of the "evidence" is as overwhelming as you profess, then it should have been relatively easy for fou to convince ary number of credible, nationally or internationally known UP()lo ists, or lor that matter any other important and credible fioure of oour own choosing. Wh: then is poor , Undelle the best prop you can ret? Why not tyrek, or Priedian, or iralter Cronkite... or for that matter, the Fope himself? Why not? You

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know exactly why not as well as I do. Consider that the recurring apparition of "Our Lady of Fatima" in Portufal in 1917 succeeded in producing throngs of witnesses who mobbed the spot by the tens of thousands- all in response to the "tall tales" of a few little children. The result: A "miracle" documented by tens of thousands of witnesses, endorsed by the Roman Catholic Church, and acknowledged by virtually every historian who has endeavored to look into the matter. I hesitate to ask this, dear friends, but if Meier's stories of "recurring apparitions" of space beings in Switzerland are the truth that you say they are, then why (pray tell) have the faithful failed to materialize? Even by your own standards, the best you can do is "over two dozen witnesses"- and we have yet to see the names and addresses of any of these: But let us foon. If Meier (who presumably was more fortunate even than lioses) has really been privileged enoug! not oniy to have seen, but actually to have photographed the Eye of God (!), then the implicatioris are stamgering! Why, theri, is he merely the subiect of a slick and well-boiled ${ }^{225-a}$-shot, privately published with profit in mind book bv a couple of virtually unknown writers in a country 5,000 miles away? Why not rather a veritable candidate for sainthood with accolades ranging from the Vatican to the U.II.? Vhy...? Somehow I suspect you know why.

Now about that House of Lords invitation you mention so prominently. Let's examine: Is it not true trat the invitation was not exactly from the House of Lords itself, but rathor from the Earl of Clancarty who just happens to ie a member $0^{-}$the House of Lords? And is it not true that the "closed session" Col. Stevens was involved with was held in a conference room and not on the House floor, and that only thirty or so of the more than l,OOO members of Lords were present? Do you care to elaborate, or shall I refer that one directly to their Lordships for confirmation? But let's go further. If your "evidence" was so stargering, then why not Commons? Why...? Could it just possibly be that those who are responsible for schedulirg such annearances before Commons tend to take Clancarty and his ideas somewhat less than seriously?

Come on folks- אet with it. You know the truth of this matter as well as I do. Frankly I must confess that if $I$ had as much of my personal finances lockeत $u$, in it as you do, I too would hesitate to admit I had been taken-- but hasn't it cone far enough? Certainly you must know that your reputations (and especially that of Col. Stevens) arc all suffering because of this thing. Any more foolishness and someone is goinf to get mad enourh to hire some hot-shot exposé minded investigative reporter to do some snooping about- then the jig will be up. And personally I don't think UFOlogy really needs another scandal a la Frank Scully/ True Fiagazine. Wouldn't it be better for you to just quietly abandon Feier before he destroys you completely....

Of course, if you must insist on beinf persistent, then I leave you with a challenfe. [:ay $]$ suerest that the Fieier controversy be solved once and for all by naming a three member panel of experts which will be emnowered to meet and examine all of the available evidence without reservation, and ultimately to nublish a final report on their findines. I further sureest that Stanton 'I. Friedman and Col. Wendellr

Stevens be named as two of the three panel members and that these t:lo be empowered to choose an impartial third member acceptable to both from the tanks of the scientific community. liaturally if your weight of evidence prevails and the case is proven to the satisfactior of the panel, then you will have strong backing for your books and will undoubtedly recoup your investment and then some. Of course, if the judgement of the panel roes afainst you, you will have to agree to drop the matter and withdraw Pleiades, Volume II.

I shall look forward with pleasure to hearing your decision on this proposal within thirty (30) days. Naturally if you accept, it will be taken by all concerned as a significant step toward solving the Meier controversy. If you decline, your critics will be left to draw their own conclusions. Whatever your decision, please note that it is my intention to seek publication of this letter at the expiration of the time frame indicated above.

For some time now certain ufologists (and or groups) have been dealing in a very manipulative way in letting other people know that our photos show nothing more then "monkeys" originally used in secret V -2 rocket experiments in the U.S. at that time. Although our response to these wideeyed stories as printed in our original report have completely put this to rest, these people continue to spread their deflamatory remarks regarding our handling of this case.

Inclosed is a report from Anthony J. Perzigian Ph.D. associate Professor of Anthropology at The University of Cincinnati, Department of Anthropology. He clearly indiciates that the "case" is still open, and due to the visual appearance in the photos and using available data, has determined that the photos do not show monkeys. This report is being presented to you to show that the case is still open and that there are respectable Anthropology professors who clearly feel "something" else is represented in the photos, and not just monkeys. We will continue onward with an objective mind in the research of our "alien body photos".

Also inclosed for your inspection is a copy of the original letter sent to Mir. Len Stringfield concerning his "alleged" second (set) of photos by the same professor. This is the letter Mr. Stringfield reproduced in his updated "story" in the Mufon Journal December 1980 issue on page 15.

We cannot comment at this time on Mr. Stringfield's second set of photos as he is keeping them secret and does not allow "outside" sources to view or examine these "mystery" photos. We can only conclude that Mr. Stringfield still feels it is "proper" to allude to his photos without throwing "his cards on the table". In the trade, this is possible called "selling the sizzle without the steak".

It should also be interesting to note when in reality Mr. Stringfield had received his letter from the professor (Nov-15th-1980) having completed his article for The Mufon Journal on December 2nd 1980. It is apparent that his photo had not been submitted for analysis much before that time, and this action had been instigated to make it appear that an open investigation is taking place, while it was done soley to make "things look good and objective" for the sake of the Mufon article.

Seeing that our report put to rest the first set of alleged alien body photos Mr. Stringfield was peddling as authentic, as a crude hoax, put together by "science fiction model builders", our coverage now a historical fact via our presentation in the Alien Body Report, we can only wonder how long before his second set of photos he now alludes to will be connected to the first set.

We must state, he is not "allowing" outsiders to view his second set of photos, so he is calling the shots on them! We are sorry to see this sort of action take place.

We challange Mr. Stringfield to come forward with his other "mystery" photos and to stop alluding to something that cannot be researched, and discussed openly and fairly by serious ufological folks.

He apparently feels it is ok to get headlines and stir up public interest in something he is not willing to reveal for all to see.

We are currently now working on other sources, including a world famous hospital burn institute for them to examine our photos.

I have had an opportunity to examine the photographs and documents concerning the Mexican UFO incident on July 7, 1948. The photographs, of course, allow but a limited evaluation of the body's authenticity and/or origin. There seems to be a good correspondence between the appearance of the specimen in the photographs and the descriptions by the eyewitness. Therefore, I will address his comments which provide far greater details than are readily observable on the photographs.

From the descriptions it is obvious that we are hardly dealing with an organism indigenous to the earth. No know man-like or ape-like creature of adult age would have such a large hcad size:body size ratio. The absence of lips, tongue, teeth, thumbs, toes, ears, nose, genitals and hair rules out an identity with known forms or classifications of life on earth. In sum, a specimen wi.th those characteristics gives no appearance of a natural, earthly origin.

Let me briefly consider the possibility of an extra-terrestrial origin. Considering only the specimen itself and not the radar sighting or the remains of the craft, I would have some doubts about the specinen's origin as outside of the earth. As a scientist and evolitionist I would basically subscribe to the darwinian view that now existing species have descended from previcusly existing species. Also, I subscribe to the vies that evolution has been, essentially, an unfolding process whereby species gradually transform in directions partly determined by (1) their previous shape and size and by (2) mutations which are altogether unpredictabie. In short, the history of life on the planct has been a unique and uarepeatable accumulation of events. Therefore, it is nighly unlikely that an organisin of non-earthly orisins would so closely though adnittedly only superficially resemble something earth-like. For example, creatures capable of interplanetary travel should not be expected to have two arms, two legs, round heads, and holes for both nostrils and ears. They, moreover, should not be expected to have arm and leg joints in positions similar to ours. I would expect some visitor from elsewhere in the universe to look literally like something from out of this world. If it is from out of this worid, then perhaps some extra-terrestrial civilization has fashioned a somewhat crude, man-like robot to comunicate with and relate to us. Still, I am bothered by the fact that it resemiles too closely an earth creature if, allegedly, it had orisimated alsowno in the universe.

From these seemingly conflicting statements you can see that $I$ an puzzled as to the origins of the specimen. I am sorry that $I$ cannot provide you with a definite or positive identification. I hope that this report is of some value to you in your work. Keep me posted of your progress.

## CRASHED SAUCERS AND PICKLED ALIENS

Is the United States government covering up the biggest secret of all time - its possession of captured UFOs?

By George W. Earley


Transporting a saucer-sized object is not an easy task. NASA uses a speciallystrengthened Boeing 747 jumbo jet to carry 75 -ton, 122 -foot space shuttle aloft.

INN THE beginning - which is to say the years immediately following the Kenneth Arnold sighting on June 24, 1947 - UFOs were called "flying saucers" and, according to humorists in the news media, probably were piloted by "little green men from Mars." Whatever they were, no one thought in the early days that the "saucers" would remain a mystery for long. For
one thing, sooner or later one was bound to crash.
It wasn't long before some people began claiming they had crashed and the air force had recovered them and their dead humanoid occupants. Such yarns got their first big exposure in Frank Scully's 1950 best-seller Behind the Flying Saucers. But the book was so thoroughly discredited that

crash claims received only underground circulation for the next quar-ter-century. In recent years such "retrievals of the third kind," as their chief proponent Leonard Stringfield calls them, have been revived and now are the focus of considerable attention.

The usual story goes like this:
Despite its public posture of skepticism about UFOs, the American military hoped to be able to capture one. So when the first reports came in from the southwestern desert that a saucer had crashed, the military moved swiftly.

Military police quickly sealed off the site. A combination of threats and appeals to patriotism effectively silenced the civilian witnesses. One or more hoaxes were carefully contrived and then "solved" for the benefit of the news media which readily (and unthinkingly) accepted authoritative pronouncements while ignoring any still-vocal witnesses as unreliable.

Civilian and military scientists and technicians were brought to the scene and sworn to secrecy. They conducted quick on-scene examinations of the saucers and their dead crews. A large crane then loaded the UFO onto a flatbed trailer while the alien bodies were sealed into containers of preservative fluid and shipped to medical laboratories. The truck, its cargo covered hy canvas tarpaulins, was driven hundreds of miles overland from the desert country to Wright-Patterson Air Force Base near Dayton, Ohio, where both saucers and crew were taken to Building 18 of the Foreign Technology Division.
In the years after that first crash. other UFOs - perhaps 20 in all have crashed in the United States while the alien body count has risen to at least 50 - if we are to believe the claims made in recent years by Stringfield, Robert Spencer Carr, Raymond Fowler and other proponents of
crashed-saucer retrieval tales
Before we proceed any further, let's return briefly to the Scully story, which is in many ways the prototypical retrieval tale.

Scully claimed he got his information from a scientific genius who in turn had the story from a "Doctor Gee" who actually examined three crashed saucers sometime in 1948: Although the craft had landed virtually intact in the southwestern desert, their occupants were dead by the time government personnel arrived on the scene. The saucers were 99,72 and 36 feet in diameter: the crewmen were all about 40 inches tall, perfectly formed, fair-skinned (so much for reports of little green men!) and clad in dark blue uniforms. They appeared to be about 35 to 40 years old.

The saucers reportedly were disassembled * by the military for shipment to its laboratories for study. Unfortunately for posterity, these priceless interplanetary vehicles were so poorly guarded that souvenir-grabbing servicemen quickly reduced them to shambles of worthless junk!

A four-month investigation by freelance writer J.P. Cahn blew Scully's fanciful tale sky-high two years after it appeared in print. Cahn's article, in the September 1952 issue of True magazine, identified Scully's "scientific genius" as a shady oil speculator (later indicted for an unrelated swindle) while the pseudonymous "Doctor Gee" turned out to be the proprietor of a radio-TV parts supply house.
By a neat bit of sleight of hand Cahn

 bled and reported |y| shipped to Dastom.
even managed to acquire a piece of metal that the oil speculator claimed had come from one of the crashed saucers. When tested, it proved to be common earth-grade commercial aluminum. Scully, who during the closing days of Cahn's investigation threatened to sue the reporter for "harassment," died some years later without either suing or recanting his tall tale.

Most subsequent crash stories have not been subjected to the searching examination Cahn gave Scully's. One reason is that the overwhelming majority of informants are anonymous, their identities known only to such committed partisans as Stringfield who refuses to reveal them. So I propose a different kind of examination of these stories - one that has never been tried before.

Let's consider three issues that bear on the question of whether or not our government possesses crashed saucers and dead aliens:
(1) Transport capability. Could crashed saucers have been transported from the Southwest to the Midwest on the road system existing in the late 1940's and the early 1950's?
(2) Alien autopsies. Who would have performed them - and where?
(3) Witness credibility and the efficacy of "secrecy" oaths. Are the informants telling the truth and what have they to fear from revealing what they claim to know?
The focus of my examination will be on the crash/retrieval accounts promulgated by Leonard Stringfield, as described by him in a speech delivered to the 1978 Mutual UFO Network Symposium in Dayton, Ohio. The speech was published in the

MUFON Symposium Proceedings. Two expanded versions have been released since then; you will find them listed in a bibliography at the end of Part Two of this article.

Stringfield's presentation cited 17 crash reports over a 25 -year span from 1948 to 1973. Please refer to the chronological table summarizing his reports before reading further.

## * * *

WE WILL begin with the proposition that we have found a crashed saucer. How do we get it from its crash site to Wright-Patterson Air Force Base?
You will note from the table that in four cases Stringfield has listed no crash site. Three other cases were at scattered sites: Mexico, California, Montana. The remaining sites were in Arizona, New Mexico and "the Amer-
ican Southwest," an area that encompasses those states and more besides.

To simplify matters, I shall use only two of the locations cited by String. field - Aztec, N. Mex., and Kingman, Ariz. - to establish some general distances from alleged crash sites to Wright-Patterson AFB.

From Aztec, which is in northern New Mexico, just below the Colorado border, it is 1270 straight-line miles to Wright-Patterson. From Kingman in northwest Arizona, near the California border, it is 1590 straight-line miles. In both cases it would be considerably longer by road.

Most of the alleged crashes took place in a six-year period between 1948 and 1953. Two more supposedly occurred in the late 1950's: one date is unknown and three took place after 1961.

The significance of these dates is more apparent when we take a close look at some history of the American road system. Today's smooth multilane and of ten divided superhighways, which enable us to drive coast to coast or border to border with virtually no red lights to impede our travel, are a fairly recent development.

The interstate highway system as we know it today was proposed in 1954 by President Dwight Eisenhower who felt it was needed not only for increased national economic growth but for national defense as well. The highways were to be able to handle our largest tank carriers and the atomic cannon, whose size dictated the minimum height of the overpasses that would cross the various interstate highways.

Actual construction did not begin until 1956. The system was to have been completed by 1972 but as any long-distance traveler can tell you, parts of it are still being built today in various states.

This means that 12 alleged crashes, involving 15 saucers and their presumed transportation to Wright-Patterson AFB, took place before the interstate highway system was even begun! Transportation therefore would have been over roads that on the whole predated World War II. Few of these were more than two lanes wide - 24 to perhaps 30 feet wide. Even fewer might have exceeded 30 feet in width. Shoulders were not paved and telephone poles stood dangerously close to the pavement.

But consider the sizes of the crashed saucers. The smallest is supposed to have been an oval $13 \times 25$ feet. Another is réported to have been $15-20$ feet in
diameter. For several we have no dimensions but we're told they carried from one to four aliens. At the high end of the size scale, we find saucers reported to be 50,90 and even 100 feet in diameter.

With a maximum 30 -foot road width, it would have required at least two lanes to transport the smallest of these saucers - that is, if there was a truck in those days able to carry it.

Now if we assumed those little saucers weighed only a few tons, which is highly unlikely, it might have been possible to get one onto a large truck. But representatives of the trucking industry have stated that as recently as 25 years ago "it was rare that equipment . . . having diameters or widths beyond 12 feet or so" would be shopbuilt and transported to field locations. Why? Because we lacked the equipment to move them.

And when we talk about moving crashed saucers, we aren't talking about picking one up from the middle of someone's paved parking lot, readily accessible to trucks and cranes and other such apparatus: we're talking about a flying machine that has crashed in such a remote location that only a few persons know it is there. It's off the paved roads. It is back in the boondocks. It is, in fact, in the middle of a desert.

Ever tried to drive or even walk in deep dry sand? You simply aren't going to cut across country with your truck, dragging a big trailer for your cargo (a cargo, I might note, whose weight you do not know) while followed by a big crane powerful enough to pick up this crashed saucer and put it on your truck.

Okay, so we'll use a helicopter. Sorry. Even today the two most powerful helicopters this country has - the Sikorsky Sky Crane and the Boeing Vertol Chinook - couldn’t lift a crashed saucer. Sky Crane's maximum lifting capacity is 12.5 tons: the Chinook can pick up 14 tons. During those early days, when saucers were allegedly dropping out of the sky, we had no helicopters capable of lifting anything near the loads that would have been involved. Forget the helicopters.

But for the sake of argument, let's say that somehow we did get that crashed saucer out of its desert sandpile, onto a truck and onto the highway. Something that spans the road from one side to the other - or nearly so - isn't exactly inconspicuous. Can we assume such a load was driven over 1300 miles without people, newsmen included, asking questions and taking pictures? After all, transporting an oversized load requires special permission. Let me cite an example.

A 107 -ton superconducting magnet, declared surplus by the Argonne National Laboratory near Chicago, was acquired by the Stanford Linear Accelerator Center in Palo Alto, Calif. The magnet, a doughnut-shaped device $18 \frac{1}{2}$ feet in diameter and $131 / 2$ feet high, was moved by truck because it was too large for rail transportation.
The special trailer had 110 wheels to spread the 107 -ton load sufficiently to prevent damage to the highways. The trip, which ended on Thanksgiving Day 1979, took 21 days with the truck traveling at 25 miles an hour. But the truck did not travel alone. It was preceded by a radio-equipped vehicle assigned to report on road condi-
tions one quarter-mile ahead, plus two escort cars and a backup trailer with spare parts and tools. Each state through which the convoy passed supplied state police cars as additional escorts. This was a pretty noticeable convoy.

According to the director of the Argonne National Laboratory, the trip would not have been possible "without the complete cooperation of officials from the states through which the maynet passed. Each state evaluated road surfaces, bridges, routing and countless other factors to assure the load would not be detrimental to bridges and highways or cause major inconvenience to motorists." Advance planning for the trip took nearly a year.

Yet this load was barely larger than the smallest of the saucers alleged to have crashed 25 years earlier - and Stringfield claims we have recovered at least four saucers 50 feet or more in diameter! Such saucers, assuming they were truck-mounted, would have required the removal of every roadside tree and telephone pole, plus many houses, stores and other buildings. After all, it wasn't until we built the interstate highways that our major traf. fic arteries stopped going directly through the heart of every city, town and hamlet. And don't forget those many one-lane country bridges.

But if road transportation is out. what about rail transportation?
The problems are much the same. While trains and their bridges can handle very heavy loads, the dimensional problem is still with us. Coming east from the southwestern desert country, the width limit on cargo is 12
feet. Height limit as far as Kansas City is $16^{\prime} 3^{\prime \prime}$, which drops to $14^{\prime} 3^{\prime \prime}$ from Kansas City farther east. But remember that about three or four feet of that height already has been taken up by the train car itself. There isn't enough clearance on the top of a rail car for a man to stand upright when the train goes into a tunnel.
Airplanes? Forget it. The planes during the 1948-53 era couldn't carry much more than a few trucks. Even today, our largest military transport, the C-5A, while capable of lifting 44 tons, can't take cargo wider than 17 feet or higher than $12^{\prime} 6^{\prime \prime}$.
So let's put the saucer on top of the airplane, as NASA does with the space shuttle. It takes a specially strengthened Boeing 747 jumbo jet, our largest passenger plane, to carry the shuttle which weighs 75 tons empty, is 122 feet long and has a 78 -foot wingspan. Again, we had nothing during the prime time of crashed saucers

capable of transporting one by air.
If we had a crashed saucer, the only way we could move it from the southwestern desert country to Ohio's Wright-Patterson AFB would be to completely disassemble it. Even if we leave aside the fact that this would be a difficult and time-consuming task (it's hard enough to disassemble something that is familiar), we still would wind up with a pile of anonymous parts. Not only would a sentry fail to recognize the significance of this jumble of metal, but you'd need a fleet of trucks to carry it all, and nowhere in these accounts of crashed saucers are we told about multitruck convoys. No - our stalwart sentry has seen but one truck, its tarpaulin-shrouded cargo instantly identifiable to his eagle eye as a flying saucer.

Pfui! I don't believe it.

## MAIL FAILS EXCELLENT STUDENT

Finally Mrs. Murray was found and the letter was delivered to her address.
Postmaster Brassard has no idea where the letter has been for the last century plus, but he said occasionally someone will hold onto an antique document for years and then just decide to drop it in the mail.

TRANSATLANTIC CROSSING
GHOST TRAVELS FREE

How can a spirit cross an ocean? Wouldn't a ghost need a host - a live body - for the trip?

THE BEAUTIFUL Belgian countryside lay in the golden glow of a summer sunset. Looking out the windows of our fast-rolling tour bus, the passengers oohed and aahed over the bright-red poppies blooming alongside the roadway - but I was tired. As a tour host I had been on a "freebie" fling through Europe for three months and it was now August 6, 1973. We had visited most of the major cities in Europe, seeing the shrines to the historic dead, and now the local guide was saying that we would stop at Flanders Field where rest the bodies of many Americans who died in the First World War.

I wasn't particularly interested. I felt as if the morbidity of mausoleums had seeped into my psyche. Even so, I thought, I should pay homage to my countrymen who had fallen on foreign soil. So I walked through the rows of crosses finally stopping at one which bore the name "Schaeffer." It stirred a strange unease in my mind - as if it were a name I should know. Schaeffer is a seldoni-seen name of German origin but hardly unique. What caused
its disturbing effect on me?
Suddenly I felt that the spirits of ages past had caught hold of me, pulling my mind into their sphere. Instantaneously, as if a magic wand had touched my heart, I felt empathy for the dead.
Somehow nothing was the same after that moment. The places and things I had seen - Westminster Abbey, St. Peter's Basilica, the Vatican, St. Mark's Square, Michelangelo's Pieta, the Via Doloroso - took on another dimension. The historic sites I was yet scheduled to see seemed more important - as if I now possessed, or was possessed by, a new spirit, one which said, "See, there is great beauty, a soul-salving peace, in the loneliness of death."
Aboard the airplane winging back across the Atlantic I felt an eerie presence within me. Strange questions crept into my mind, all focused on the spirits of the dead. Would transatlantic flight present a problem for apparitions? Wouldn't a ghost need a host a live body - for the trip? I was plagued with such macabre thoughts

CRASHED SAUCERS AND
How credible are stories that claim our military has recovered the bodies of several dozen humanoid beings?

IN PART I of this stud y of claims that our government has retrieved captured UFOs I explained why it is difficult to believe that in the late 1940's and early 1950's flying saucers crashed in the desert in our Southwest and were moved halfway across the country to Wright-Patterson Air Force Base in Dayton. Ohio. Depression-era roads.
lack of suitable transportation (neither trucks. trains. nor airplanes could do the job). and the enormous distances involved all add up. in my estimation. to Mission Impossible.

EEN IF those hypothetical crashed saucers could not be moved intact, let us assume their existence long enough to examine retriev.

alist claims about the little alien corpses reportedly found in or around such crash sites.
Using the body count supplied by UFO investigator Leonard Stringfield, whose 1.978 accounts of crashes, corpses and retrievals comprise the bulk of the data for the claims we are examining here, we discover that the minimum number of alien corpses exceeds 50 and could go as high as 75. Now that's a lot of dead bodies to have in cold storage somewhere.
But the bodies are said to be small
(the term "child-sized" is of ten used) and hence are easily transportable something that cannot be said of their vehicles.
Most accounts describe these childsized aliens as four to five feet tall* with oversized heads, narrow waists, thin legs and slender arms whose thumbless hands have long, tapering. possibly slightly webbed fingers.

[^0]The facial features on their hairless oversized heads are small, except for the eyes which are said to be large and slightly slanted and to curve around the sides of the skull. The mouth is lipless and the nose rudimentary at best; outer ears also are missing.
The scenario as described by Stringfield, Raymond Fowler, Frank Scully and other advocates of crashed saucers has the little corpses lying on the ground, in a tent or on a table for some indeterminate length of time before being shipped off, presumably to be autopsied at some major medical facility. We are told some on-scene examinations took place but it is unclear if the examiners were merely military and civilian personnel who happened to be on hand or if medical authorities were present.
One thing seems certain: the task of performing detailed autopsies would not be turned over to a civilian county coroner or to medical personnel assigned to a nearby air base or army camp. Such facilities lactk the equipment to make a meaningful examination of such specimens. Shipment to a properly equipped major medical installation seems a logical next step.
Not surprisingly, none of the published accounts identifies the institution that is supposed to have received an alien for autopsy. Some accounts imply the examinations were conducted in civilian facilities but this seems unlikely. Given the security precautions reported in connection with saucer crashes, I can't believe the military would turn over an alien corpse to a bunch of civilians. Where then, might the bodies go?

I asked a highly respected member
of the medical profession. Now a cardiologist associated with a major civilian medical research and teaching institution, he was formerly a navy physician. He is therefore familiar with both military and civilian medical facilities.
I asked him, "If you were the man in charge, where would you send those corpses for examination? What institutions, military and civilian, do you feel would be best equipped to perform autopsies and related studies on alien bodies?"
He too doubted that the military would release alien corpses to civilian institutions but his reason differed from mine. The military, he told me, is quite capable of doing first-rate research in its own medical facilities.
For example, he said, the Walter Reed Medical Center in Washington, D.C., contains both the Armed Forces Institute of Pathology and the Army Medical Research Center. Microbiological studies could be carried out there as well as in conjunction with researchers at the U.S. Naval Medical Center in nearby Bethesda, Md.
He pointed out that some of the best quarantine facilities in the United States are located at the Johnson Space Center in Houston, Tex. NASA held our astronauts there following their moon flights to be sure they had not brought back some outer space disease that might ravage Earth's population." If an "Andromeda strain" were brought back to earth by astro-

[^1] encl the people of earth lace an uncertain future.
nauts or aliens, the logical place to study it, said my informant, would be at the Communicable Disease Center in Atlanta, Ga. The CDC is a branch of the U.S. Public Health Service.

I also asked him for an estimate of the number of persons who would be involved in all aspects of such studies. He noted that there would have to be surgeons of varying specialties, nurses, photographers, X-ray technicians, pathologists, microbiologists and specialists in a number of the other related disciplines that have developed as terrestrial.medicine has become both more specialized and more thorough in its study of human beings. Clearly, perhaps as many as 100 would be involved.
My source, whose contacts throughout the medical fraternity, both civilian and military, are extensive, is unaware of any alien autopsy activity. When we consider the number of persons who would be involved in such activity, it seems improbable that a secret of this magnitude could be kept for as long as 30 years.
Of course, to be fair to the retrieval ists, they say the secret is not being kept: it is leaking out little by little via deathbed confessions and guarded anonymous revelations made to saucer investigators by various participants and observers. In most cases persons making claims of either first- or secondhand knowledge profess to be constrained from open public announcements by signed secrecy oaths and the fear of government prosecution should such oaths be violated.

Stringfield claims that the witnesses with whom he has spoken have kept silent all the years because of such fears.

Unfortunately his accounts all are anecdotal and devoid of documentation. They include such tales as these

- A dying woman, after recounting her sighting of alien bodies while working at Wright-Patterson AFB said she now no longer needed to fear what "Uncle Sam" might do to her.
- A son said his father had "confessed" on his deathbed that he had seen two UFOs and four alien bodies at Wright-Patterson's Building 18 in 1953.
- Another son reported that his father has his account of saucer and alien-body sightings in a sealed envelope in a safe deposit box. The alleged witness is still alive.
- A former guard told his sweetheart some tantalizing tidbits of unearthly sights, then clammed up. He says he "isn't allowed" to say more.
- A pilot and former army warrant officer, who somehow was inside an air force hangar when crates of alien corpses were unloaded by a forklift, allegedly still is controlled by a "security officer" who has forbidden the pilot to tell Stringfield any more about the bodies.

The pilot and family, Stringfield adds on an ominous note, have since moved without leaving a forwarding address. No doubt we are to imagine that the security officer has sequestered the family to prevent further leaks. Paranoids doubtless will prefer to believe the family has been killed and now lies buried under a section of superhighway along with Jimmy Hoffa.

RANKLY I think this is twaddle Nowhere in Stringfield's nearly

two dozen accounts (or in anyone else's for that matter) is there one shred of verifiable evidence. The reader must accept Stringfield's judgment of the tales he has heard and of the persons who told them. I regret to say that my study of his reports does not encourage me to believe any part of them.

But I do fully agree with his opinion that it will take the established truth of only one such tale to utterly demolish the government's decades-long position that all UFO reports are of conventional phenomena. All I am saying is that as yet no one has supplied that "truth."

Let's take a closer look at this matter of secrecy oaths and penalties for their violation.
Under the provisions of Section 798 of Title 18 of the U.S. Code, military personnel as well as civilian government employees in appropriately sensitive positions are liable to prosecution for violations affecting the national security of this country. If convicted, violators are subject to prison terms of up to 10 years and/or fines of $\$ 10,000$.
In the past the military, principally the air force, has used such regulations as JANAP 146 and AFR 200-2 to require the reporting of UFO sightings in such a manner as to make the reporters liable to Section 798 if they disclose details of their report without proper authorization.

But to the best of my knowledge and I challenge the retrievalists to cite proof to the contrary - no one has ever been tried, let alone convicted, under the provisions of Section 798 Title 18 (or any other law for that mat-
ter), for the improper release of UFO information.

After all, the military and its civilian bosses have spent 30 years flatly declaring that reports of extraterrestrial UFOs are nonsense and are kept alive solely through the efforts of various maladjusted personalities such as hoaxers, psychotics and money-grub. bing exploiters.

If there were any truth to these tales of crashed saucers and pickled aliens, the last thing the government could afford to do would be to prosecute people now for revealing what the military has denied for years. A public trial (and the Amcrican Civil Liberties Union would see to that!) would blow the whole thing sky-high and prove the retrievalists were right.

Remember, in those cases where former CIA employees have written books or in other ways revealed classified agency matters, prosecutors have found themselves on the horns of a dilemma. Do they prosecute, with the attendant risks of publicizing even more sensitive information, or do they let the malefactors go free? One answer can be found in the Pentagon Papers caper. How much time did Daniel Ellsberg spend in prison for stealing and publicizing those documents? Right - no time at all.
So there it is. I say there are no crashed saucers and no little "men," green or otherwise, in the hands of any military or civilian agency.
I hold this negative view despite my firm conviction that the interplane-tary-origin theory of UFOs deserves a far better hearing than it has received to date. But we do that theory a disservice if we base it on flimsy evidence
and credulous accepianice of every attractive tale that comes along. Thic cuoes not mean that retrieval claims should not be investigated. Of course they should.

But please take a hard-nosed, critical look at the "evidence." Don't let informants evade, sidestep or otherwise gloss over questionable areas in their testimony. Don't fail to ask hard questions because you fear you'll embarrass someone. As an investigator, you are called upon to collect verifiable evidence. Where UFOs and alien bodies are concerned, UFOs and alien bodies are that evidence. If you can't produce them, you have no evidence. Remember, secondhand stories aren't proof, deathbed confessions aren't
proof, sworn testimonials aren't proof, even photographs aren't proof.
Withoui pinnf vour report, however interesting, is speculation. And on far that is all the retrievalists have produced.

## These Wonderful Aliens. THE UFO PEOPLE

essential for life-the elemental constituents of living organisms-are round throughout the vast and visible universe!

Going along with this, many UFOlogists believe the home of visiting aliens are from our own galaxy. Or even the star systems of far-distant galaxies. My feelings, like a good number of other UFO theorists (including the late Ray Palmer), is that their origin possibly lies closer to Earth. No, not from another planet of our solar system, or inside Earth itself. They could be coming here from many different places. From an unseen parallel universe in a different spacetime continuum from ours. From another dimension. From the spirit world. From OAHSPE's "atmospherea" and "etherea". And so on.

This is not to say that I completely discount UFO origin to be interplanetary, from outer space. Never! Perhaps some DO originate from our, or foreign, galaxies of our physical universe.

An objector, however, would ask how this can be so. He would argue that if Einstein is right in claiming that nothing in the universe can be surpassed by the speed of light186,000 miles per second-then how can I with reason state that UFOs may still be visiting us from galaxies millions (or more) light years away? At this point, allow me to quote a paragraph from LIFE IN OTHER SOLAR SYSTEMS by Frederick I. Ordway III.
"If we assume that it takes between 3 and 5 billion years of chemical and biological evolution before an intelligent species evolves on a habitable planet, we would expect civilizations to have begun to emerge some 3 billion years after the creation of the first stars in the Milky Way galaxy. We do not know how old the Milky Way is $\rightarrow$ stimates run from 10 billion to 25 billion years. This means there should be, toward the galactic center, 10. to 12-billion-vear old
civilizations. Against the backdrop of figures such as these, our 10,000-yearold culture would barely correspond to the first gasps of a newborn infant."

To indulge in supposition, let us suppose that there are outer space intelligences that became so millionsno, make that BILLIONS-of years ago. These near-divine races (if their progression ${ }^{*}$. remained steady and unvarying) would be light-years (no pun intended) ahead of us in art, science and technology, among so many other things. Indeed, they would be beyond our comprehension, just as man is beyond the comprehension of the lowly beetle-a piteously poor comparison.

So, if these exalted beings are truly near-godly in their "magical" scientific knowledge and accomplishments, then MAYBE they have devised ways of conquering incredibly vast cosmic distances. Maybe they ARE coming to Earth from the furthest reaches of space. Not by exceeding light speeda definite impossibility, let us assumebut by using "short-cuts". Another dimension is a likelihood. Black holes are another, as theorized by such a noted and esteemed astronomer as Carl Sagan.

Therefore, all things considered, how can one logically dismiss the theory that at least SOME UFOs are INTERPLANETARY visitors in every sense of the word?

Let us say that one such wondrous race is dissatisfied with nature's own arrangement of the several planets that make up their solar system. Would they do something about it? COULD they do something about it? Unquestionably they could, for would not these near-godly "cosmic engineers" have an awesome science and the fantastic technology to do the job?

Many science fiction authors have thought similarly. In his story, BETWEEN PLANETS, Robert A. Heinlein suggested a plan of moving Pluto and Neptune closer to our sun, while distributing Mercury further out.

Ingeniously, another science fiction author, Kenneth Bulmer, wrote in WORLDS FOR THE TAKING, about bringing planets from OTHER solar systems tọ orbit OUR sun.

In PATTERNS FOR CONQUEST by George O.! Smith, the near-gods would project a 5000 -mile sphere out of the core of the Solarite's sun and hurl it into sub-space. As a result, their sun would turn into a violent variable. Those inhabiting its planets would then have a choice of either migrating inside a year to the other suggested solar system, or perish.

## "The People Have Been Seeing Something"

That intelligent life exists elsewhere in the universe is taken for granted by UFOlogists. A further belief of theirs, I would venture to say, is that many aliens have set foot on Earth in visitations, and that Earthians have actually confronted them.
> "Aliens have set foot on Earth in visitations, and. . . Earthians have actually confronted them."

Such a story appeared in The National News Extru for December, 1973, complete with not only the contactee's photograph, but that of the disembarked alien itself! Unfortunately, no date was given for the time of the encounter, but presumably it occurred during the latter months of 1973.

One wonders about this story. Can it be true, or is it an out-and-out hoax? And what of the photographs
that accompanied, the article by Kelvyn Park? Genuine or not? Here is the story for the reader to decide for himself or herself.

Involved in the bizarre encounter was Jeff Greenhaw, the young police chief of the small town of Falkville, Alabama. Had he been able to foresee the results of his public statement of his encounter, he would, without question, have kept quiet. The harassment and ridicule received was for him a new and chilling experience. Even his wife, Pamela-But we will come to her later.

It all began when Greenhaw received a night-time telephone call at his home. The caller, an excited woman, reported having seen what she described as a "spaceship" with flashing lights that had landed in a field west of Falkville. Greenhaw was then fully aware of other recent UFO sightings reported by Alabama residents. For example:

Mrs. Norma Blanton and her family from Walker County watched a UFO's descent in a field near her house that changed colors from white to green to blood-red. With its lights abruptly cut off, family members jumped into a car and drove to the spot where it landed. Moments later, as they drew nearer, lights from the UFO lit up, and it disappeared.

At about the time of this sighting, numerous other reports of a UFO reached the police in the nearby town of Parrish.

Several policemen, as well as City Councilman, Larry Entrehin, spotted a hovering UFO with green and red lights. This was over a stockyard in Cullman, forty miles north of Birmingham.

Two shotgun armed youths in Mobile County saw a saucer-shaped object hum to earth. Firing two shots at it, they later told the police that a door slid open briefly prior to the UFO vaulting skyward to disappear.

Alabama psychiatrist, Dr. Stonewall Stickney, commented on the recent
wave of sightings by saying they were not hysteria or imagination. "I think the people have been seeing something," he added. "And there is no reason to think they're not from some other planet."

Getting back to police chief, Jeff Greenhaw's telephone call from the excited woman reporting a landed "spaceship" with flashing lights. Greenhaw grabbed his camera, raced out of his house, and sped in his patrol car to the scene.

He was shortly to get one of the biggest shocks of his life. For there, standing in the middle of a gravel road, was a creature not of this world. The alien was humanoid, featureless, and covered in a metallic material. Its head was topped by an antenna.

Once out of the car, Greenhaw managed a "Howdy, stranger" though scared stiff. The other remained silent, immobile, then advanced forward.

At this point, Greenhow unfroze and put his camera to work. He snapped four pictures.

Now they were only ten feet apart!
For some unknown reason, Greenhaw next switched on his car's blue flashing lights. Apparently this act caused the creature to turn and run.
"I jumped into my car," Greenhaw related later, "and took after him, but I couldn't even catch up with him in a patrol car. He was running faster than any human I ever saw."

Unexpectedly, his vehicle went into a skid. For an instant his eyes left the fleeing alien. When he again looked back, the other had disappeared.

Not surprisingly, Greenhaw was transformed from a non-believer of alien life to a staunch supporter. Not so Pamela, his wife of over three years. In the circuit court of Decatur, Alabama, she filed-and received-a quick and uncontested divorce.

As we have just seen, confronted aliens act in ways not understandable to us. Their actions and behavior are often dramatically different and
unorthodox. In the Greenhaw case, the entity ran at fantastic speed.

Other witnessed cases have described their means of locomotion as waddling, floating and bouncing. They have been observed to leap to excessive heights and to display astonishing strength. And, what is perhaps most incredible of all, they are seemingly invulnerable to our weapons of bullets, shotgun blasts, knife penetration, etc.

## Now You See Them, Now You Don't

Like their craft, they have been seen to appear-and disappear-in a brief instant. Stating that their time exists in a different sense to what we are accustomed to would not be rash. The likelihood is strong that they don't even come from our own universe.

Their sudden and mysterious appearance, and equally sudden and mysterious disappearance, could be

due to their entering, and leaving, our universe from their own dimensional universe. Time does not necessarily have to move in their universe as it does in ours. More likely there would be a difference in that it would move either faster or slower. Backwards? Perhaps. Who can authoritatively say otherwise?

For all we know, theirs may be a six-dimensional universe, not a fourdimensional universe like ours.

Perhaps, also, aliens are visiting us from origins where time moves in ways not presently understood by Earthians.

Along with UFOlogists, there are many astronomers who nod affirmatively when asked if they believe in other-world intelligences in the universe. Two such were America's Carl Sagan, director of the Laboratory for Planetary Studies at Cornell University, and Russian-born Joseph Shmuelovich Shklovsky of a Moscow State University.

1966 was the year that saw the publication of INTELLIGENT LIFE IN THE UNIVERSE. This thick book was the joint effort of Sagan and Shklovsky who were then (as they are now) living many thousands of miles apart.

Sagan was born in 1934. At an early age, he read Edgar Rice Burroughs, and his fictional character, "John Carter". Having also read H.G. Wells, Jules Verne and Willey Ley, he was fascinated by prehistoric animals and interested in the writings of members of the British Interplanetary Society. His parents were Rachel and Samuel. Carol was his only sister. No brothers. Divorced, Sagan has two sons, Dorian and Jeremy, who live with their mother.

Shklovsky is a brilliant theoretical radio astronomer and astrophysicist.

While collaborating, the two firmly believed in the strong possibility of extraterrestrial life, with literally millions of alien civilizations similar to ours existing in our lens-shaped Milky Way Galaxy. Sagan still holds to this theory. Later Shklovsky's views underwent a sharp reversal. However, in mid-1978, the Soviet scientific journal, Voprosy Filosfii, published an article of his in which he said:
"It has taken Mankind about ten million years to evolve from ape-like creatures to beings with the ability to travel in space. It is certainly not unreasonable to think that we will advance an equal amount in the next ten million years."

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
