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# AVRO SAUCER 000 TES FL OVAN 

$\Lambda_{0} V_{0}$ Roes saucer shaped oraft, the Avro car, has suacessfully flown in tethered flight. Sir Roy Dobson. cheirman of the board of Avro, sald the oraft wiuld be flown in a week or two, "unshackled". Actually, it has been undergoing tethered test-flights for several months. The height to which it flew was merely shoulder high, but will quite soon go into free flight. The squcer will undergo wind tunnel tests within a few weeks. However, Avro engineers are reported troubled by engine overheating and stability control. It is believed the Avrocar will have a much higher speed than most air--land vehioles under development which operate on an air-cushion.
The Germans claim to have built a sauces in 1945 that rose to 37,000 feet and soreamed along at $1,200 \mathrm{~m} \mathrm{~m}_{\mathrm{o}} \mathrm{h}$. Britain developed a VTOL oraft from the Avro theory and a mock-up model was sent to England from Malton. Duncan Sandys then minister of supply, announced in 1954 that a saucer-like oraft had flown successfully.
The $\Lambda$ vrocar operated by employing a physics principle called the Coands: effect. This is a situation which states that fluids in motion tend to follow a ourved surface. The novelty of the craft, as opposed to "ground oushion vehicles" such as the British Hovercraft, is that a variation of the Coanda is used to provide forward motion. The principle can be simply demonstrated by holding a finger under a strean of tap water. The water tends to curve around the finger. It is this bent-iair which transforms the lifting power to forward motion. A Vashington spokesman sald the U.S. Army hopes to purchase substantial numbers of sauoers to give infantry troops unprecedented mobility and speed. It has an edge over other experimental VTOL devioes
because of 1 ts theoretical high forward speed. It makes a loud roaring when In flight. ithe sound is said to have a far higher pitch than that made by propelier-driven alrcraft or jets. A "gauces" has been areted and shipped to Moffet Fleld, Callf., for high speed tests. The tests will be conducted at Ames Researoh Centre, opera'ted by NASA. Members of the special team whioh developed the Avroosy will accompany it for the tests. It is understood that a demonstration of the saucer w111 take plade in November at the Avro plant primarily for U.S. observers. There are at least 2 saucers, about 25 feet in diameter at the Malton plant.

Sven after many months have passed, continued investigation and eveluation may disclose a faked UFO photo that was supposed to have been genuine. The following two cases are examples of perpetrated hoaxes. In the case of the UFO photo from Japan, ( $3 e 0$ SSkes 412) many months passed before the truth was revealed, while in the Danish case, the story and faked UFO photos were uncovered in a very short time. SAYS SAUCERS NOT VISITORS FROM SPACE The above conclusion, based on extensive scientific research ant 17 years of radar experience, was reached last night by Holi. In the last article I mentioned that anyone, with a dosire to find the solution to the UFO mystery, could do so if he or she would set aside the time, be willing to let the Bible speak for itself and use a good Concordance for tracing out referenoes. Naturally you must set on the right trail, for not all connected with the UFO is either pleasant or grandoise in its unfolding, yot the story of this phenomenon carrios a terrific impaot as you dig deeper and deeper into the Soriptures. For those who are interested in the UFO alone and not the entities, let me give you a few references for a start. Using a Concordance, further references can be looked on as you study. Look on the following: Pealma 68:17; Daniel 7:9,10; Jeremiah 30:23, 23:19,20, 25:32, 4:13; 2nd kings 2:11, 12; Paalm 18:10-15; Joel 2:2-7; Isaiah 5:26-28, 60:8, 66:15; Amos 1:14; Habakkuk 3:4-12; 2nd Kings 6:17, 18 and of course the ist ohapter of the Book of szeklel. Ada to the above the 5 th chapter of the Book of Zechariah, particularly werse 3,6 and 7 The translation of both camons of the Bible, by a single individual, is a remarkable task of monumental proportions. James Moffatt completed a new translation of the Bible in 1926, revised in final form in 1935. He used the earliost known texts to create a modern olassio. His vigorous modern speech, coupled with his complete adherence to the minutiae of punctuation and paragraphing of the ancient manusoripts, makes lioffatt's tronslation a valuable addition to any IIbrary.
I have ploked lioffatt's translation of a part of the Book of Jude, to illustrate the meaning and purpose of the scuoer entities. There is a mountain of other references throughout both cannons, but Jude, in a few short verses, unfolds the mystery in a most convincing manner.
"... Beloved, my whole concern was to write you on the subject of our common salvation, but I am foroed to write to you an appeal to defend the faith which has once and for all been comnitted to the saints; for certain porsons have slipped in by stealth (their doom has been predicted long ago), impious creature who pervert the grace of our God into immorality and disown our sole lioge and Lord, Jesus Christ! Now I want to remind you of what you are perfoctly aware, that though the Lord once brought the People safe out of Ejgyt, he subscquentiy iestroyed the unbelieving, while the angels who abandoned their own domain, instead of preserving their rank, are reserved by him within the nether gloom, in chains oternal, for the Doom of the great Day--just as Sodom and Gomorra and the adjacent oitios, which similarily glutted themselves with vice and sonsual pervergities, are exhibited as a warming of the everlasting fire they are sentenced to suffer.
"Despite it all, these visionaries pollute their flesh, scorn the Powers celestial, and scoff at anzelic Glories.... These people are stains on your love feasts; ther have no qualms about carousing in your midst, they look after none. but thomsolves, rainless clauds, swept alons by the wind, trees in autumn without fruit, doubly dead and so uprooted, wild waves foaming out their own shame, vandering stars for whom the nether gloom of dariness has been reservod oternaily
"For these people are murmerers, grumbling at their lot in ilfe-ethey fall in their orm passions, their talk is arrogant, they pay court to mon to benefit therselves.
"Beloved, you must remember the words of the apostles of our Lord Jesus Christ: they told you beforehand, "At the ond of things there will be mockers who zo by their ow impious passions." These are the people who set up divisions and distinctions, low oreatures destitute of the spirit. But do you, belovod, build up yourselves on your most holy faith and pray in the holy Spirit, so koeping yourselvos within the love of God end walting for the mercy of our Lord Jesus Christ that ends in Iife eternal. Inatoh some from the fire and heve mercy on the wovorers, trembling as you touch them, with loathing for the garment which the filesh has stained..."Amen.
