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OBJECT SPARKS SPECULATION!

An announcement that a U.S. satellite had disintegrated in space Sunday (Jan. 22, 1961) stirred speculation here today that a "meteorite" which flashed across Alberta skies Sunday evening was a part of the satellite plunging to earth.

Word of the destruction of the satellite---one of the Discoverer series launched by the United States---came from the U.S. Air Force Space Surveillance Control Centre at Bedford, Mass. It was identified as the Discoverer 19.

The Bedford announcement said the satellite had made about 525 circuits of the earth and speculated that its disintegration by entering the earth's atmosphere came possible over the Pacific.

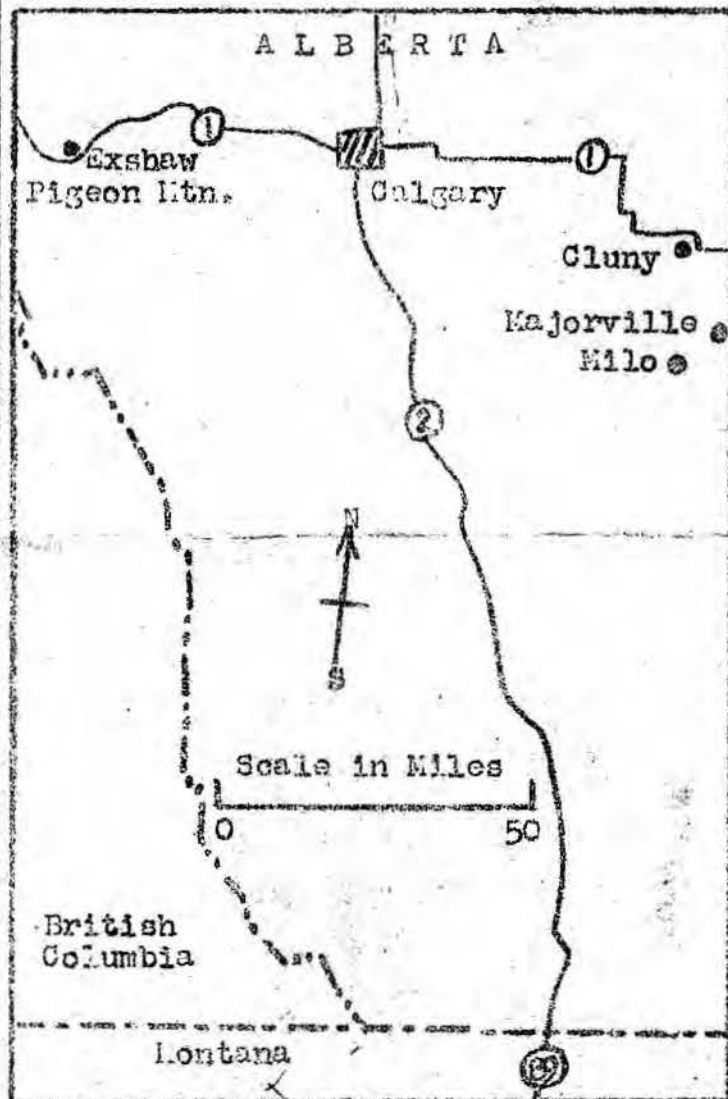
The U.S. was last reported to have 15 satellites orbiting around the earth and the Russians one.

Dozens of Calgaryans reported seeing what they believed to be a meteorite flash across the sky Sunday evening. Their descriptions of it varied widely. A meteor was reported to have landed in Montana. As reports continued to come in Monday it became certain that more than one object came down.

The Herald's correspondent at Milo, 50 miles away southeast of Calgary, reported Monday that two objects fell within a few miles of each other near Milo Sunday evening....one piece narrowly missing a car driven by a 16-year-old boy.

Bruce Morrin, of Cluny, said a glowing object flashed in front of his car as

he was driving from Milo to Cluny. The incident occurred $8\frac{1}{2}$ miles east of Milo.



"I was never so scared in my life." Morrin said. The unidentified object appeared to

Korrin to come from an easterly direction. It landed in a field about a quarter of a mile away from the road. The site is believed to be just inside a nearby Indian reserve. Korrin estimated that the object he saw would measure about two feet around. It emitted large quantities of flame before it came to earth. Korrin did not wait around to investigate further. His father reported he was still badly shaken up by the time he reached home.

The other unidentified object fell six miles east of Majorville, 20 miles away from the spot where the first one came down. It was seen by Fred Bertschy from his farm. One large piece was seen to come straight down out of the sky. Smaller pieces fell near a power line two miles farther west.

Mr. Bertschy said the larger object appeared as big as an aeroplane. His first impression was that it was a plane, and that its wings were falling off. There was a "lot of flame" in this case too.

Neither sites where these objects came down has been investigated. It is rough country and the belief is that the only way to get in for a close look would be by horseback. A Calgary geologist, Alan McGugan, advances the theory that there were at least two meteorites in the sky Sunday evening.

He reports that he was drifting east on the Trans-Canada Highway near Exshaw when he sighted a bright green incandescent object with a distinctive "tail". It flashed low across the sky above Pigeon Mountain from north to south.

More on Calgary Sighting...

Following interviews conducted by members of the Calgary branch of the Royal Astronomical Society in the Cluny-Milo area this much has been added: From the description of witnesses the research team concluded the objects must have been metallic. This does not, however, nail down the identity of the object or objects.

Meteorites are also compounded of metal.

Meanwhile a search of three square miles of country in the Cluny area by the society team turned up nothing in the way of physical evidence. Headed by Eldon Rogers, the five included Lee Gray, Russell Paddington, Morris Aizenman and Jack Phillips, all of Calgary.

Despite the fact that eye-witnesses said the flying object passed close overhead, a six-hour search of the fields in the indicated area turned up nothing in the way of holes in the ground where an object might have buried itself.

FLYING OBJECT HOVERS ONE HOUR OVER U.K.

Exeter, England. (Reuters)--A mysterious "flying object" was reported to have hovered in one spot over Exeter today for more than an hour.

Officials at the local airport said "We do not know what it is. It was seen on the radar screen and we have had it under observation for some time. "We think it is pretty big. It appears to be shining brightly and is about 50,000 feet up," he added.

A mysterious object also was reported seen over Scotland Sunday night by hundreds of persons.

Tyler, Texas. (AP)-- East Texans reported seeing a long flaming object in the sky last night and hearing an explosion shortly after it vanished. The object was seen over Tyler, Longview, Sulphur Springs, Marshall and other points.

Johnny R. Peavy, Tyler, said he "saw a long flaming object, bright yellow flames in the front part and orange flames in the back, falling in the sky. It was east of Tyler. It was visible for only a few seconds. About two or three minutes later I heard a blast." Authorities had not discovered where the object fell. MYSTERIOUS FLASHES OVER WIDE B.C. AREA

The sky over a widespread section of British Columbia erupted in mysterious flashes and explosions early today. Reports of the phenomenon came from the Interior and Howe Sound.

A Vernon RCMP constable said a brilliant blue light lit up the sky for 30 seconds about 4:15 a.m. It was followed by a loud explosion. It was also reported in Kamloops, Revelstoke and Salmon Arm by residents. A Revelstoke railway worker said a plume of smoke stayed in the sky for about an hour after the explosion. An RCMP plane investigated a report of a flash and explosion in the sky over Bowen Island about 7:30 a.m. but found nothing. A spokesman said reports indicated the flash occurred between 3,000 & 5,000 feet. "Our plane search Bowen Island for wreckage from a possible plane explosion but found no trace of any," he said. Explanations were sought from the Royal Canadian Air Force, NORAD, interior radar stations and telescope stations. None could suggest a cause of the phenomenon.

'FLYING SAUCER' IN SECRET TRIALS

A flying saucer was tested today before senior navy and air force officers at Mount Hope Airport under a cloak of secrecy.

Startled eye-witnesses said the craft hovered above the ground during the tests. Estimates of the altitude reached varied from six inches to five feet.

Measuring about 20 feet in length, the craft looked like a bowler hat with tail fins on the rear. It has a cabin that would carry five or six persons.

The strange machine was towed into Mount Hope last night under a police escort. Policemen were told it was a boat.

The word "saucercraft" has been printed on the side of the machine in blue letters.

Witnesses said the test pilot during today's experiments was an army lieutenant-colonel.

It is believed to have been designed and built by Lieut.-Commander Adrien Phillips of HMCS Star, Hamilton, for commercial rather than military use. The saucercraft apparently broke a drive shaft during today's tests and has been wheeled into a hangar at Mt. Hope for repairs.

Tarpaulins, old tires and blocks of wood have been piled on the craft as camouflage.

It is made of white fibre-glass and is reportedly driven by a souped-up automobile engine.

Workers were seen removing two propeller shaped turbines from the craft this morning.

It is believed the rotating turbines force air through ducts on the belly of the craft providing an air cushion that lifts it from the ground.

Undercarriage of the craft consists of a single wheel at the rear and two small posts which support the lightly constructed machine.

The tailfins would enable the craft to manoeuvre once it became airborne. Experiments on flying saucers have been underway at AVRO Aircraft in Toronto for several years.

Mr. Gaglardi told the congregation that in the space race "there's no such things as 'we did it first', because God did it first. Elijah was the first astronaut--he went to heaven in a chariot of fire. He went into orbit and he's not back yet."

SAUCERS: A HOAX, A.F. COLONEL SAYS

Spaceships from other planets never visited our atmosphere. Flying saucers are a hoax. There is no scientific evidence to substantiate fantastic claims made by UFO hobby groups. This, the official position of the Air Force, was stated Friday evening by a spokesman, Lt. Col. Lawrence J. Tacker. Col. Tacker told the Aero Club of Buffalo Friday evening in the Buffalo Trap & Field Club: "Any claim that flying saucers as spaceships have visited our atmosphere is absolutely erroneous. There is nothing in Air Force files, classified or unclassified, which would prove or tend to prove that spaceships have entered our atmosphere." (Credit: Gladys Fusaro, Huntington, L.I., N.Y.)

IT'S FLYING SAUCER CAKE

Eagle River, Wisconsin. --Joe Simonton a plumber who lives about four miles outside of this resort town, said today he carried a jug of water to three men who landed in his yard in a flying saucer, and was given three pieces of "flying saucer cake" in return.

Simonton, about 55, said he gave the cakes, 3 inches in diameter and perforated with little holes, to Vilas County Judge Frank Carter to turn over to authorities.

Simonton described the saucer as about 12 feet from top to bottom and about 30 feet in diameter. He said it was made from gleaming silver.

He said the saucer landed Tuesday, but he kept quiet about it because he was afraid of skeptical reactions.

The trio manning the craft, he said were short -- about 5 feet and 125 pounds. They wore black uniforms and looked Italian.

UFO CONVINCES EDITOR

Something up there likes us. Or so it would seem to this observer after watching a mysterious light sail around the skies for some two hours last night.

I must admit that reports last week of people sighting UFOs, left me with eyebrow raised, the editor's customary badge of skepticism.

After last night, I'm a believer-- although I don't know what to believe. A little after 8:30, Gary Cooper had just finished telling about The Real West on TV, I stepped outside to move a lawn sprinkler and glanced up. An orange light was moving swiftly through the star-sprinkled sky, about 45 degrees above the western horizon, from south to north.

It disappeared in the direction of Orlando. Shortly afterward, another orangish light, accompanied by the fam-

iliar rumble-whine of jet engines, soared back along nearly the same trail, headed south.

As it faded toward Miami, out of the northwest again appeared The Light, almost as if it were trailing the jet, looking over its shoulder.

Determined to observe it without the traffic noises and lights of 13th Street to distract me, I jumped in my Volkswagen and sought out a quiet vantage point on the edge of town.

Silently The Light moved from north to south. I could associate no noise with it nor could I estimate its height, except that it was above the scattered, filmy clouds.

At times its orange light changed to a pinpoint of intense brilliance. As Jacksonville Mayor Haydon Burns described it after a close brush with it while flying over Fort Pierce last week. "It was like looking directly into the filament of a light bulb."

When it got low on the southern horizon it didn't drop out of sight like a conventional aircraft, but seemed to hang suspended for more than five minutes.

Finally The Light winked out. I saw it three times later in the evening in the southwest and at one point, as an airplane flew over, it abruptly changed course from north to south and disappeared behind the clouds. That was the last time I saw it.

UFO SIGHTED IN AIR OVER WAYNESVILLE

A.F. CHECKING OUT MORE 'UFO' OBJECTS

Dayton, Ohio, July 8 (UPI)-- The Air Force is checking out two sightings of UFOs made by Ernie Stadvec, owner-operator of Stadvec Aviation, Inc., at Akron, Ohio.

Stadvec reported he sighted the first UFO at 10:15 pm on July 4, while flying at about 4,000 feet between Cleveland and Akron. He made the second sighting the following night about the same time.

Major Robert Friend, of the foreign technologies division at Wright-Patterson Air Force Base here, said he believed what Stadvec saw was "Atmospheric refraction of the star Capella," a star of the first magnitude.

Stadvec reported he spotted a greenish object that came down from about 1 o'clock high on a collision course with his plane. He said it then stopped and went 330 degrees azimuth to the northwest and stopped again, before shooting upward and disappearing.

He said the next night the same thing happened, only the greenish object did not perform erratically. He said it came straight down, stopped and went off to the northwest again.

WAS IT A FLYING SAUCER?

The following was taken from the notes of the Daily Log Book of the Polish steamship "HUGO KOLLATAJ."

Not until now did the Polish Press mention about the interesting sighting by the Polish sailors of the above mentioned steamship.

It happened on November 24, 1959 during the trip of the Hugo Kollataj to Rio De Janeiro at the height of the islands of the Green Peninsula.

The 1st officer, J. Chrapkiewicz, who was on night watch at the time with J. Pzenny and other members of the crew. By the established measurement of the position of any unit in the sky, I noticed suddenly in the sky about 20 degrees from the right side of the front of the ship, a shining spot

surrounded by whitish light, resembling noon-lights."

This spot was more or less 10 degrees above the planet Saturn. The bright object moved toward us with a great speed. When we could see it plainly, we noticed that the top was rounded while the bottom was flat.

At certain moment, the object halted and remained stationary for a while, then suddenly departed with exceedingly great speed and vanished beyond the horizon.

The enormous speed and the shape of the shining object, then the sudden change of the direction of its flight, can not be compared with any of our earthly flying or astronomical objects. This sighting lasted about 6 minutes, beginning at 8:11 pm.

At the same time there was received a warning from the crew of the nearby steamship "CARINALDO" which also sighted a similar flying object. Information about the sighting of this uncommon phenomenon had been also sent from a number of other ships navigating in that vicinity under different flags.

"STRANGE SATELLITE" WATCHED MAY 20/61

Cambridge, Mass. Satellite tracking stations around the world were asked today to help track a "suspected, unpredicted bright satellite."

The order went out from Smithsonian Astrophysical Observatory after the strange satellite was spotted yesterday at Jupiter, Florida.

"We're trying to get other sightings and get an orbit," said George Woron, Smithsonian's chief of public information.

Woron said there were more than 50 satellites and rocket bodies whirling around the world and "it sometimes happens" that one is picked up which does not match any of the known orbits. He said scientists had no reason yet to believe the satellite was "anything new or mysterious" and that such orbiting mavericks were spotted "with some regularity." (N.Y. Mirror, Cr: G. Fusaro)

NEW YORK--(CP) If scientists manage to make contact with beings in space, what is the first message that should be sent?

"Help!"

Dr. Harlow Shapley, Harvard Astronomer, mentioned this suggestion yesterday

before a symposium attended by 1,500 persons from the fields of science, education and business.

Shapley's words may have a familiar ring for people familiar with witticisms about exploration of space but he appeared to think it was only half funny.

At the symposium entitled "Life in Other Worlds," Shapley said man would do better solving such problems as the population increase on earth before tackling the unknown of space.

British historian Arnold J. Toynbee reacted seriously to the question about communication with space strangers, declaring, "I think we should ask them; 'Have you done better than we here?'"

Included with Shapley and Toynbee on the panel were Dr. Otto Struve, director of the U.S. National Radio Astronomy observatory, Dr. G. Kistiakowsky, chemistry professor of Harvard, and Dr. Donald N. Michael, Brookings Institution senior psychologist.

Quizzed by a panel of reporters about possible messages to space, Struve backed away, saying "I doubt whether we should reply at all. Perhaps we should let them tell us."

Kistiakowsky would ask whether "you are really satisfied with your lot" while Michael, wanted to know "what do you most want to know about us?"

The symposium apparently didn't discover new scientific marvels. Toynbee analyzed the remarks of the astronomers to mean that it is improbable life as this world knows it will be found elsewhere in our solar system, while it is more that probable that some kind of life "comparable or more than comparable" to our own exists in the countless celestial systems.

MYSTERY STONE BREAKS TWO WINDOWS OF HOUSE

Simcoe, Ont.--Police are beginning to wonder if Simcoe vandals are wearing stilts these days.

They are seeking the explanation of how a stone, which crashed through two windows and a wall of a Simcoe home, was apparently thrown from a height of 25 feet. "I'm baffled," Constable Robert Woods wrote in his report of the incident to Chief George Ashby.

The stone, about the size of an egg, crashed through a sunporch window, then a living room window, and finally through a kitchen partition at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Lorne Earl, 136 Victoria Street, about 2 a.m. yesterday. Constable Woods, who investigated, said the stone travelled in a straight line through the two windows and the partition and was finally halted by a spruce 2 by 4, which was dented by the impact. Con. Woods said it would have taken someone with a powerful arm to throw the stone in a straight line through two windows and a wall.

But where the thrower stood is the mystery.

The ground in front of the house slopes sharply down toward the grounds of the Norfolk Golf and Country Club.

Sighting along the stone's course, Con. Woods estimated that the thrower must have been at least 25 feet above ground level.

He rejected a theory that the stone might have been thrown from a considerable distance.

"If that had been the case the stone would have followed a downward curve," he explained. "But it went through the house in a perfectly straight line." To a suggestion that the thrower might have used a slingshot the officer replied, "No matter what he used, all the evidence says he had to be 25 feet above ground to throw the stone in the straight line it took through the two windows and the wall." 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STRANGE CELESTIAL PHENOMENON WAS OBSERVED IN TEGUCIGALPA, HONDURAS

A strange phenomenon was seen in the sky of Tegucigalpa last Wednesday, a little before or after 8:30 pm. by the owner of the Orah Sawmill, Mr. Lee Jones, and 8 of his workers who had been alternating turns from 7 to 9:30 pm. on the same date.

The account of the event was maintained in most absolute reserve by Mr. Jones, because he supposed, perhaps, that the news would awaken a great number of baffling (or uncomfortable) reactions among the public; nevertheless, this day, the owner of the sawmill, situated for the past two months at the extreme east of the bridge, "Juan Ramon Molina," made up his mind to give the facts to the daily newspaper, "EL DIA."

The workers of the above named establishment, Eulalio Giron, Jose Lagos, Reynaldo Valle, Eugenio Moncada, Juan Yanes, Alejandro Vargas, Felipe Giron, Jose Corea and Mr. Jones, saw "a dark red sphere of more or less six inches in diameter" appear by the peak of the hill, El Berrinche, at a whirling speed, stop to situate itself over the center of town, in a swaying movement, during some 15 seconds.

Mr. Jones, who was a commercial pilot for many years, estimated that the strange object "could well have been travelling at the respectable speed of 2,000 miles per hour," although, he added, this refers simply to an estimated calculation. Soon, the object changed from dark red to bright red, continuing to a dull yellow in order to pass, in fractions of seconds, to a bright yellow; and finally, the lunar disc in a cutting trajectory of "more or less 90 degrees," displaced itself toward the extreme west of the city where it remained, changing in a flash to "sky blue" as if it had become an odd star.

The witnesses, in relating the news to the reporter, only cast an insignificant margin of discrepancies. Some appeared to have not noticed that the object changed color alternately; others would have had it with a greater

or smaller extent in diameter. Asking Mr. Jones about his personal opinion concerning the strange object, he stated to us frankly that he was completely baffled. He was not able to treat it or discuss it as a sort of rocket made by man, he said to us, "having given that cut of 90 degrees in trajectory, discards that possibility. Simply, he added, "I do not know what to think of it."

"At what height over Tegucigalpa could the object have been travelling?" we asked. And hesitating somewhat, Mr. Lee Jones replied: "It would be necessary to have knowwhat size the object was in order to calculate its altitude. A quick calculation; "some 5,000 feet." WILD WAR TALE -- FACT OR FICTION?

London (AP) A British publishing firm issued Sunday a 'non-fiction' book claiming that American intelligence agents prevented Soviet Premier Khrushchev from unleashing a secret weapon of unimaginable horror on the U.S. on Sept. 17, 1959.

The book, THE DAY KHRUSHCHEV PANICKED, was written by George B. Mair. In it he claims that the Soviet premier was ready to start a third world war on that September day when he was sailing across the Atlantic with other Communist bloc leaders in the liner Baltika enroute to a meeting of the U.N. General Assembly in New York.

According to Mair, Khrushchev had the idea of raining destruction on the U.S. with "anti-matter" bombs fired from an orbiting satellite. The bombs supposedly would obliterate everything within a wide area.

But U.S. intelligence broke the Baltika's radio codes, found out about the plot and forced Khrushchev to abandon his plans by threatening to sink the ship in mid-Atlantic, Mair said.

The Scottish doctor said Khrushchev had a fit of fury over being thwarted but regained his composure by the time the Baltika docked in New York.

A reporter asked him why K was sailing to New York while his scientists were planning to obliterate much of U.S. "All I can say is that the Russians were sailing pretty far north and that most of the anti-matter was due to strike in the south," Mair replied. "I asked my publishers to publish this book as fiction although most of it is true." The publishers are Cassell's. They published Sir Winston Churchill's war memoirs. If Zan has a sales pitch it must have been on that page which was torn out, for the other 11 pages contain only a hodge podge of Imperial Proclamation and World Predictions.

Zan calls for oneness, a movement which ultimately would embrace the entire planet--led by himself. What's more, it's most elaborate proclamation states, "Just be kind."

Women are not forgotten. The self-styled emperor says he prays the women of the world will get together and hold their own little revolution. The RCMP, which keeps an eye on subversive organizations, claims to be unaware of Zan's plans for world government. (The Ottawa Citizen, June 24, 1961.)

SCIENTIST SUGGESTS LIFE ON OTHER PLANET
MAY KEEP US AS PETS, PROTEIN SOURCE

New York (AP) 'CBS Reports' explained a lot about space & scientific progress. Most scientists agreed the chance of life existing on nearby planets, except Mars, seemed remote. But none discounted the real possibility it may exist on the more distant ones.

One professor suggested that the human race might become slaves of intelligent species from other planets, older and much superior species than the human race.

"The best we could expect would be the sort of treatment we give domestic animals here," he said. "We're kind to them, and feed them, and when they are big enough we slaughter them. We could well be an excellent source of protein to an exceptionally advanced species."
