The Oradell, Now Jersey Incident of September, 1962.
On Saturday, September 15, 1962, at 7:55 p.m., three boys told police that they had seen a strange oval craft set down in the Oradell Reservoir just south of the Oradell Avenue dam. The three sald that the object hovered over the water, submerged for a fow seconds and then rose vertically and disappeared. As further proof, a fisherman on the opposite side of the reservoir reported hearing a large splash at just about the time the boys said the object hit the water. To compliaate matters still further, large banana shaped tracks reported In Emerson ( a nearby town) where still other witnesses claimed the UFO landed first. The U.S. Air Force sent a representative to the area and police then barracaded the land from the public.
The next day, Sunday, Sept. 16, 1962, two Emerson youths reported seeing a similar object dip behind some pine trees bordering the reservoir. A few seconds later, they reported a noise like a car door slamming, only louder. Upon talking to one of the boys, 1t was found that the object appeared to be domed and had two portholes along its perimeter. At this point, the parents of the witnesses were called up by local police and told that their sons should refrain from speaking about the matter since the government requested a secrecy pollcy.

The UFO seen on Sept. 16th, was shaped like this.

Two days later, on Tuesday, Sept. 18th, over 100 people flocked to the Oradell Reservoir in hopes of seeing the return of the UFO. Many sported binooulars \& cameras in order to observe and record the craft. The situation had grown to such proportions that it was impossible to evade the subject in conversation. Barbershops, school corridors and classrooms hummed with excitement as a small scale panio got under way. On the same night, two Westwood policemen reported seelng a fast moving object shaped like an inverted cone while still others reported strange beams of light and fastflying red 11scs. At this point, the theory that the UFOs were really birds with 4 -foot wingspan was advanced but the public quickly blashemed 1t.
The following day, Wednesday, Sept.19, the heavy rain dampened the spirits of manj yet 20 people still turned out at the reservoir hoping to catch a glimpse of the controversial craft. Nothing was seen seave the rumor that Oradell Pollce shot at a 14-foot man with shotguns. However, in neighboring communities, nine other witnesses, including patrolmen, sighted strange aerial objects, including one which was seen to land.

On Thursday, Sept. 20, 1962, once again the series of incidents was prolonged as four Emerson boys spotted a similar craft near the reservoir. A formation of 3 jet fighters approached the UFO and went under it. As the jets attempted to make another pass, the UFO silently rose and disappeared. This like many of the other UFOs took on the appearance of burning magnesium, known for 1ts bright white color.

Friday, Sept. 21, 1962. As a $\nabla 1 \nabla 1 d$ and fitting close to an exciting week, two formations of six large, bright, white objects were seen. The flrst was observed at Pulaski Park in Hackensack by
some youngsters and their parents while 200 people atop Garret Mountain in East Paterson played host to a sim1lar awesome display.

Monday, Sept.24, 1962. The ReCORD, (a Hackensack newspaper) received a letter from a group of Bergenfield boye who clalmed they constructed and flew a craft made up of a helium ballon with a balsa wood frame and controlled by radio waves recelved by a small onehorsepower motor. This seemed to be a good enough explanation for the public but in the minds of the witnesses and "saucer enthusiasts," there was doubt.

The New Jersey Assoc. on Aerial Phenomena learned that the three boys of the sighting on September l5th have been silenced so that not even a teacher could get any information out of them. The whole thing has come to an abrupt end ever since some Bergenfield boys sent that letter mentioned above to the RECORD. NJAAP is attempting to secure signed statements from some of the witnesses and photographs of the landing area. It is the opinion of this organization that the witnesses observed true UFOs and not the allegedly constructed object composed of a hellum balloon, balsa wood and radiocontrolled motor. NJAAP is attempting to secure the names of these persons to end the ridicule which is now

"This is a frightening place. As soon as it is dark, I will board my spacesh1p and return to Mars."

And that's why you haven't seen any men from Mars Lately.

## Capture of an asteroid would assist research

A method by which a payload of moderate size can provide orbital payloads millions of times larger has been proposed by Dandridge M. Cole, Consulting Astronautical Engineer of General Electric's Space Vehicle Division. His proposal would have astronauts from the earth reach into space to capture an asteroid to return it to the vicinity of the earth where it could be used as a source of raw material for future space explorations.

Astronomers believe that approximately five billion years ago another planet circled the sun between Mars and Jupiter. They reason that at that time a cataclysm took place which broke up the planet into myriads of smaller particles ranging in size from about 500 miles down to a foot. Today over 2,000 of these asteroids have been discovered and catalogued. However, those which have been discovered are of modest size and can be photographed on plates with moderate exposures. There are probably hundreds of thou-
sands larger than 300 feet and when we go to the smallest in size, there must be millions. Thus there's an infini ${ }^{+}$number of particles in space.

## Comes Close To Earth

Some of the asteroids come close to earth; in fact, some of the large craters formed on the earth in the past may have resulted from the impact of asteroids. There are many asteroids which come within 20 million miles of the earth. One, Hermes, in 1937 approached within 400,000 miles of the earth. Although Hermes is less than one mile
in diameter, there is still a tremendous volume of material in an asteroid of this size.
With asteroids as a tremendous reservoir of raw material, how do we capture these to swing them into an orbit around the earth so that we may cannibalize them?
Mr. Cole suggests two ways: One is to arrange a propulsion unit on the asteroid to swing it close to Mars and have the gravitational pull of Mars act as a gravitational whip to swing the asteroid close to the earth. The other method is to arrange a. propulsion unit to swing the asteroid in toward the earth and have it enter an earth orbit.

## Mythical Asterold

To acquire a feeling for what is necessary, Mr. Cole has suggested a mythical asteroid which he calls THEORETICUS. This asteroid is 3,000 feet in diameter and has a mass of a trillion pounds. Mr. Cole assumes that perhaps a major constituent is water and thus the specific gravity is one. The closest approach of the asteroid to the sun-perihelion-he takes as one astronomical unit. This means that the asteroid comes as close to the sun as the earth. The farthest distance from the sun is 1.62 astronomical units. The asteroid is moving in the plane of the earth's motion around the sun and its period is one and a half years. When this asteroid passes close to the earth, it is moving at 20 miles a second, which is two miles per second faster than the earth's motion around the sun.

With these characteristics it is now possible to plan a change in the motion of the asteroid to capture it. It can be maneuvered from a heliocentric orbit to a geocentric one. However, energy is required to effect this change. The required change in perihelion velocity is 1,480 feet per second and the energy required for the earth to capture it is 34,000 trillion foot pounds. To put this number in its proper perspective, we might consider that a one-megaton nuclear bomb with about 1,000 pounds of nuclear propellants will yield about 1,000 trillion foot pounds if an efficiency of about 25 per cent is assumed. This means that to change the course of the asteroid about 44 one-megaton bombs are required. The total mass of the nuclear propellants will be 43,800 pounds while the total payload will be somewhat less than 150,000 pounds.

## Changing Direction

To bring the asteroid in it will be necessary to go to the
asteroid and holiow out a large chamber. The nuclear bombs would be set off in the thrust chamber so that the directionof motion would be changed. Another possibility of changing direction is to explode the nuclear bombs on the surface of the asteroid.
If electric rockets or nuclear termal rockets are available, the material of the asteroid can be used for the expellant in these forms of engines to achieve the end result-the capture of an asteroid.

## Rich Capture

Once the asteroid is captured, then scientists would have achieved a multiplication factor -in terms of payload-of about seven million. This means that
the 150,000 -pound payload sent to the asteroid has been increased to a trillion pounds and the ratio of these two numbers is on the order of seven million.
Once the asteroid has been brought into an elongated earth orbit, it can be used for a variety of purposes. It can be used as a laboratory with zero gravity and vacuum conditions. It can be used as a source of structural materials for building in earth orbit. It can provide deep living quarters for astronauts to shield them from the hazardous radiations of space. It can be used to refuel earth orbiters at a much smaller cost than bringing material up from the earth's surface. Finally, it may be the only economical way of bringing new materials to the earth.

## Mystery Material From Sky Covers Plant

Great globs of a white, sticky material fell from the sky Thursday afternoon and settled in balls and sheets and threads over much of the Utah Power \& Light Co. Gadsby Plant, 1407 W. North Temple.

Some pieces were 60 to 70 leet long and gave the appearance of a tattered parachute. But the substance was sticky and disintegrated into nothing when stretched far enough.

Some 50 employes first saw the white material high in the sky about 2 p.m.

Pete Beloz, a transmiesion engineer, said, "At frst it looked like two or three parachutes coming down. Then as it came closer, we saw it was big globs of this stuff. A lot of its got tangled up in transmission lines, but it didn't cause any trouble. It was all over the place. I've never seen anything like it before."

He sald some of it was in big balls, other parts were In sheets and threends. "It looked like a tarantula spider web," he said.

The material came from the north and fell from the sky for 15 or 20 minutes, apparently mostly in the area of the Gadsby plant.

No one knew what the mysterious substance was, but guesses ranged from something caused by the Hercules exploston Wednesday afternoon to an invasion from outer space.

Dr. Grant Wynn of the State Health Department, informed of the phenomenon Friday, said he had no guess as to what the substance might be.

Said Prof. Friedrich Kaempffer: "If a person were efected into space alive his organs would explode, killing him instantly. Then the body would continue to orbit the earth just like a satellite but I haven't a clue how long it would last."

Dr. Goidon Shrum, former dean of physics, thought the body would olbit perhaps forever.
He said it would be frozen stiff and providing it didn't
re-enter the earth's atmos phere it would circle the earth endlessly.
"I must say if someone wishes to have his remains preserved 1orever, this would be quite permanent," he said.
And what about the villain of the piece? Cculd he be. tried for murder? Who would try him?
"The fact the body is in space would make no difference whatever," suggested Prof. Charles Bourne of the UBC law school.
"A murder charge could be successfully ,prosecuted without a body."

Bourne explained if a body (already dead) was dumped from a spaceship the court where the murder was committed would have jurisdiction to hear the case.
But if the actual killing took place in space the problem, he agreed, would be more difficult to determine who would have jurisdiction to try the case.

This could lead to new laws being passed establishIng jurisdiction, he sald.

Added a provincial government legal authority:
"When criminals can put bodies into orbit easily we'll be able to put police into orbit easily.
"The police will rush around in space looking for the dead bodies.
"They might be easier to find up there than if they were buried down here."

## SPACE SPYING SIMPLE

## FOR U.S. SCIENTISTS

WASHINGTON (AP)-U.S. space officials who redorted Russia made unsuccessful attempts to send spacecraft to Mars and Venus aren't saying how they got their information. But other scientists say this form of space spying isn't too tricky.
The National Aeronautics and Space Administration said Wednesday that the Soviet Union has failed in five out of six tries to send probes to the two planets. And the sixth try was only a qualified success because its radio transmission died far from Venus, said the agency.
Russia has not made public any space mistakes so how does NASA know about them? Apparently the Russian space technique is at least part of the tipoff.
NASA said the Soviet scientists used a parking orbit in each of their six planet probes.
This means a three-stage booster is used to put the spacecraft in a low orbit around the earth. When the spacecraft is in alignment with its target planet-Mars or Venus-a fourth stage would fire, hurling the spacecraft toward its desination.
Scientists said the restarting of the engine in the parking-orbit method is fairly easy to detect when a satellite is being tracked in orbit.
And when a restart is attempted on a Soviet vehicle it clearly indicates an attempt to send the vehicle on a deep probe-especially if Mars or Venus is in a favorable alignment.
When the restart attempt fails the trackers can determine whether the rocket is tumbling over or is breaking up and reentering the atmosphere.

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THE LANCASTER, PENNSILVANIA SAUCER FLAP By Thomas Roark, C.O.R.A.P. Director

The jear of 1962 has proved a very profitable one for the local UFO observers of Lancaster, Pa., U.S.A. Why? Because the city and county of Lancaster have been subjected to a prolonged flying saucer "flap" consisting of nearly one hundred objects reported to the Correspondence Organization for the Research of Aerlal Phenomena thus far.

The most spectacular sightings occurred on the night of April 23rd, when approx. 70 UFOs invaded the heavens of Lancaster. On this particular night, mysterious groups of bright lights swept across the city, being witnessed by several persons.

The observers agreed that the strange lights consisted of seven different groups, each group possessing from elght to twelve lights. Each group was travelling in a V-formation from south to north.

M1litary and space sources were contacted, but they admitted they were at a loss to explain these dramatic UFOs.

On July llth, an amateur photographer snapped a photograph of a mysterious satellite" transversing the sky from east to west. It is a known fact that satellites only travel in a general west to east direction. However it is still conceivable, although unlikely, that perhaps the UFO was an earthly nation's satellite after all - a secret satellite launched from a security region with no members of the press present.

Then there was that mysterious \& unexplained explosion of August l8th. Occurring at about 11:50 A.M., Eastern Standard Time, the terrific blast shook powerful buildings, rattled houses, knocked down stores' shelves, and burst windows in the downtown area All oonstruction sites were reported as 1dle.

By m1d-September a basic trend established 1tself. In the early portion of the "Saucer Era", everyone saw disc-shaped objects. Later we had cigar-shaped UFOs and low-flying "night lights". Now, in Lancaster, everyone is reporting "mysterious sat-
ellites". Reports of such high-flying objects were received by CORAP on August 29th, September 7th, September 8th, and September loth. Two of these four sightings had the UFO travelling from south to north at a speed approximately li $\frac{1}{2}$ times that of a genuine satellite.

The above sightings, plus additional reports, constitute the current flying saucer "flap" of this city. The "flap" has accomplished only good for UFOlogy thus far. Increasing pressure from CORAP, coupled with the rise in sightings, caused the local press to develope a more objective stand on flying saucers. Another result is the increased interest in the subject shown by local residents. Ridicule is dropping. More people are looking up. Reports continue to arrive.

If this present "flap" continues, who knows what could happen? Well, we'll soon find out, because the eightmonth barrage of sightings has shown no signs of letting up.

## 'BALL OF FIRE' OVER ISRAEL

Tel Aviv, -- Eyewitnesses described a "ball of fire" that passed over Israel from north to south tonight.
Some sa1d 1t had showed a blaze of colors and had left a trall of smoke. Police sources in Jerusalem had said earlier that it had been a small rocket traveling from Jordan.
Another theory was that it was an American Echo satellite launched in 1960. It was due over Israel in the late afternoon.
Most reports said, however, that the object was seen between 5:30 and 5:45 p.m. local time. The satellite was due at about 4 p.m. (The New York Times, Credit: Gladys Fusaro; Huntington, Long Island, New York.)

Host Truman Bradley introduces this play with a fascinating demonstration of the probabillty of flying saucers actually existing. He uses the whirling blade of an electric fan to demonstrate that extreme speed can make a solld object "van1sh". Th1s, he says, suggests the reason why no scientilically acceptable photos have ever been taken of fiying saucers.

# Trip To Venus Lonely And Perilous <br> (Edilor's note: Each seneration has been stirred by <br> Mariner H's eyeless instruments can only infer. Given a <br> IT IS THE zodiacal light. 

the exploits of its explorers - Columbus' lonely vozage of discovery: Livingstone's steamy trek throush Africa: Peary's bleak struggle to the North Pole. Now man has planted a tentative foot in space, with his eyes on the planets themselves. What dangers face him in that boundless vecuum; what glories will he see? The following dispatch, based on the flight of the Venus ex. ploration rocket Mariner II, provides some of the answers.

WASHINGTON - For an astronaut, the 109-day journey to Venus on which Mariner II is so brilliantly embarked would be a terribly lonely and perilous venture.
It also would be an introduction to beauty and grandeur on a scale hardly imaginable.

The Mariner astronaut would see the magnificent slow - motion dance of the sun's sky - filling coronal streamers, the luminous and seemingly endless ocean of the zodiacal light, and a blinding closeup of the great shining globe of Venus.
Mariner II left Cape Canaveral, Fla.. Aug. 27, 1962, on a $180.2^{\prime}$ million mile voyage to the outskirts of Venus. the "twin of earth" in the family of planets which wheels perpetually around the sun.

CLIMAX OF THE flight will be a 30 -minute period on Dec. 14 when Mariner passes cross the sunlit face of Venus only 9,000 miles from the brightest and most mysterious of the earth's near planetary neighbors.
The 447-pound Mariner, resembling a miniature oil derrick with flaps. is the most intricate and gifted spacecraft ever launched. It carries instruments which should tell us, on Dec. 14, whether life is possible on the cloud-masked planet whose surface has never been seen by man.

Direct descendants of Ma riner Il some time in the 1.970's will carry even better instruments - the eyes and mind of a human pilot. But for this pioneering venture there was no room aboard for a man.
NEVERTHELESS, many an astronomer would be glad to risk his life to see what
picture window looking out on solar space, what might a human observer see and feel on the way to Venus?
If he lonked sharp. he misht have seen the blue horizons of earth described by astronauts John H. Glenn Jr. and M. Scott Carpenter. A minute later he might have seen simultaneous auroral flashes in the northern and southern hemispheres.
Pulling free of the earth's gravitational domination. thousands of miles out into space, a backward glance would reveal a monster grey - blue globe little resembling the green earth he had left.
WHEN THE astronaut had got as far from the earth as the moon. what he saw might give him a shock - the lovely globular earth at that distance might resemble a giant tad. pole with a tail of luminous gas steaming behind the planet under the pressure of the solar wind like a comet's tenuous appendage.
The big jolt would come moments later. With the mass of the 'earth and moon out of the way, he would abruptly become aware of the sun's corona and the zodiacal light.
The sun, if he looked at it through eye-shielding glasses. would be a crisp, sharp disc. Erupting into space all around would be the everchanging corona, a seething region of pearly white streamers shooting perhaps half-way from the sun to. near planets such as earth.

THE STREAMER material surges into space at something like 500 miles per second. But from the Mariner astronaut's perspective they would seem to change in shape and size imperceptibly like clouds.
About half-way between sun and earth he would see the streamers break up into blobs and patches, showing where the magnetic fields containing the streamers had begun to lose their control.
The corona owes its benutiful diffuse light to the scattering eflect of electrons amongst the charged particles spewed constantly from the dynamic sun.
In the so-called plane of the ecliptic, the great wheel in space within which are embedded the planets revolving around the sun, there is another brilliance, as bright as the milky way.
a glowing sea created by the diffusing effect of cosmic dust on the sun's radiance. This dust may be the residue of comets.
Whatever it is it appears to fill solar space, and wherever Mariner II goes its imaginary pilot will see it as a gigantic glow extending toward and away from the sun.
These lights, coronal and zodiacal, may merge and blend. They are thin. Distant stars and planets are visible through them. Far away from the earth's obscuring and distorting atmosphere, the sky background is black, stars no longer twinkle and the sun becomes shaprer and brighter.
ON HIS WAY to Venus the astronaut would have few phsical sensations, assuming he was appropriately shielded against the sun's unobstructed brilliance in space.
At mid-course correction on Sept. 4. when Mariner II responded to whispered radio instructions from earth with the promptness and grace of a cow pony, the astronaut might have thought the sky was revolving around him.
Actually, the spacecraft was tumbling nearly 140 degrees to put its guidance rocket in the right position to fire. This pitching manocuvre might have gone unnoticed by a human observer if it had not been for the fact that the visible stars and planets would appear to have swung loose from their moorings.
WHEN THE courseochanging rocket fired, pushing the craft into a tighter orbit around the sun and pulling it therefore closer to the path of Venus, the astronaut might have felt a slight sensation comparable to the tug of gravity on earth.
But it was soon over and the feeling of weightlessness. which had prevailed for more than a week, would return. In this condition, with motion counteracting the pull of the various competing heavenly bodies, the astronaut would feel lighter, in fact, than a feather.
By the time il passes within 9.000 miles of Venus, Mariner II will have plunged one-third of the distance from the earth to the sun.

THE SUN then will be a far sharper and brighter and larger and grander object that it was as seen from earth.
Venus at 9,000 miles will be considerably more impressive
than the earth was at the same distance. Venus' dense clouds reflect twice as much sunlight as does the earth, They make the earth's moon seem pale by comparison. The moon is about. 340,000 miles, from the earth.
At a distance of 9.000 miles. Venus would appear to be more than 100 times the size of the moon and brighter by far than any moon.

## 'Fantastic' <br> Telescope Developed

CAPE CANAVERAL, FIa. (AP) - A missile and satel'tte traciding television - telescope far more precise than the best radar has been developed experimentally by a group of U.S. Alr Force scientists here.
The military potential of such a camera for tracking, mapping and battlefield surveillance is little shart of fantastic.
It already has been used to take photographs of orbiting Soviet and U.S. satellites at altitudes of 150 miles with such precision that they can be distingulshed by shape.
It is so sensitive that it can photograph an object no larger than a bowling ball at an altitude of 100 miles.
By using the natural llght present on even the darkest night this camera can take pictures in the dark better than a man with a box camera shooting in bright sunlight.

## Photographs Moon

It has photographed and identified craters on the moon no larger than 2,100 feet in diameter with less motion distortion than still photos taken with the best telescopes in the world.
The 23,000 - pound camera, mounted on an old ant-aircraft gun frame, will be used to track astronaut Walter M. Schirra Jr. during lift-off on. his projected six-orbit trip around the world.
The camera was developed by by Walter H. Manning Jr., chief of the space track division at the air force missile test centre at nearby Patrick Air Force Base.

SPOT " SICKLY GLOW" HIGH IN SKY BUT NO RCAF RADAR SIGHTING
Thej're seeing objects in the sky again. Two ladies on an early morning drive Wednesday in this area reported sighting, a tangerine-sized ball---glowing a sickly color. The ladies, Mrs. Anne McClay of Toronto and her aunt, Mrs. Ethel Littlemore of RRI, Stroud, reported sighting the object at the intersection of Pine Grove Avenue and the 25th sideroad of Innisfil township. Mrs. IcClay told The Examiner, her aunt sighted the object first and both got out of the car for a second look. She sain, "It heaved my stomack right on the spot. One of the weirdest things I have ever seen in my 11 fe ," she added. She described the vision as a bright orange glow that changed in shape from round to oval, travelling from northwest to southeast. It was visible for about 30 seconds. They sa11 the sky was almost cloudless at the time. A check this morning with RCAF radar station, Edgar, drew a blank--"negative" no sighting. (The Barrie Examiner, Ont. July 26, 1962.
