

Your letter of 1 February 2007 made a number of requests for information under the Freedom of Information Act and I will answer them in order.

Firstly, I have chased the Air Attaches Office in Washington to see if they have a copy of BDS/RAF/3003 dated 14 December 1992 regarding the alleged "Aurora" hypersonic aircraft but they inform me that the relevant file was destroyed in 2001. I have also contacted ACAS and DIS but they were unable to help. If you think the Foreign Office may have material that could be of interest regarding this matter, you should contact them direct.

File D/DS8/75/2/1 Part G: "UFO Reports and Correspondence" has been located and is being prepared for release to the National Archive.

I attach copies of papers relating to a meeting between Lord Hill-Norton and the then Under Secretary of State (Armed Forces), Lord Trefgarne, in October 1985.

I have found a signal and a UFO report from RNAS Culdrose, concerning a sighting on 11 September 1985 which may be the incident you are looking for. I have been unable to locate any documents indicating that follow up action was taken.

You requested copies of a UFO report from Glenavy, Northern Ireland made to ATC Aldergrove in December 1989. An incident was reported for 21 December 1989 which is probably the incident you are looking for. I could find no other incidents in Northern Ireland around that time.

I have been unable to locate a copy of the *report* for an incident involving a Hercules aircraft being pursued by a large triangular object on or around 7 March 1997. I do however have some correspondence on the matter, which I attach.

Likewise, I have been unable to find any documentation relating to an incident in Norfolk over the summer of 1997 when a fibrous, candy-floss like substance was observed and subsequently collected by a member of the public. I have, however, found a similar incident occurring in Birmingham on 18 March 1997. I attach a copy of the telephone report made on 20 March 1997, together with a UFO report for the incident. The telephone report has been redacted to exclude other reports that do not form part of your request.

Mores, addresses and telephone numbers of some individuals have been removed under mption s.40 (Personal Information). A small amount off information in paragraph 2 of DI55/108/15 dated 20 August 1985 has been withheld under Exemption s.26 (Defence).

If you are unhappy with this response or you wish to complain about any aspect of the handling of your request, then you should contact me in the first instance. If informal resolution is not possible and you are still dissatisfied then you may apply for an independent internal review by contacting the Director of Information Exploitation, 6th Floor, MOD Main Building, Whitehall, SW1A 2HB (e-mail Info-XD@mod.uk). Please note that any request for an internal review must be made within two calendar months of the date on which the attempt to reach informal resolution has come to an end.

If you remain unhappy following an internal review, you may take your complaint to the Information Commissioner under the provisions of Section 50 of the Freedom of Information Act. Please note that the Information Commissioner will not investigate the case until the internal review process has been completed. FOI Request - UFOs

Dear

Thank you for your letter of 10 January in response to my FOI request made on 4 December 2006. I'm grateful to you for making inquiries with the Air Attaches office in Washington to trace a copy of the document BDS/RAF/3003 dated 14 December 1992 relating to the operation of the alleged hypersonic aircraft Aurora over the UK. Please could you keep me updated on progress. It does appear odd that the file from this period does not contain any official responses either from the US Department of Defence, or the US Air Attache in London to the inquiries made by **Section 20** the head of Sec(AS), at the time. Could you advise if these documents may be held elsewhere, either by ACAS, the DIS or even the Foreign Office?

I also want to raise a small issue which I discussed with your predecessor In 2004-5 she sent me a list of UFO files held by MoD and/or awaiting transfer to the National Archives. One file on this list, your ref D/DS8/75/2/1 Pt G: UFO Reports and Correspondence 1980 was listed as "missing" and attempts were being made by your records division at Hayes to trace its whereabouts. Would you be able to follow-up my earlier inquiry and confirm that this file either remains missing or else has been located? I would be grateful for any information on this matter.

I now wish to make a fresh request under the Freedom of Information Act as I am entitled after 30 working days. This request is mainly for papers relating to a number of specific UFO sightings reported to the MoD between 1985 and 1997. I have listed the specific requests in chronological order below. Please supply copies of any papers or material relevant to the five subject areas held by MoD:

- 1) Papers relating to the meeting between Lord Hill-Norton and the Under Secretary of State (Armed Forces), Lord Trefgarne, in October 1985 to discuss UFOs and the Rendlesham incident. I believe this meeting involved DS8, DI55, RAF GE and generated a number of briefing papers and reports during the summer/autumn of 1985.
- 2) UFO report made by RNAS Culdrose on or about 13 September 1985 and any follow up inquiries.
 - 3) UFO report from Glenavy, Northern Ireland, made by ATC Belfast (Aldergrove) in December 1989. Again I believe this report was subject to a number of follow-up inquiries by MoD units in January 1990.
- 4) UFO report made by member of the public to RAF Lyncham on or about 7 March 1996 relating to 'a large triangular object larger than a Hercules' pursuing a Hercules aircraft.

5) UFO report made to MoD by a member of the public in Norfolk 'during the summer of 1997' which was followed by the observation of a fibrous, candy-floss type material drifting in the breeze which was collected in a jar by the witness. (My source for this incident is the MoD's UAP Report released to me in April 2006. The case is referred to in Volume 2, Working Paper 22, pg 22-1. The author refers to a report made to MoD by a member of the public. Please could you supply a copy of the report and any other material related to further inquiries, particularly any analysis carried out on the substance.

If I can be of any further assistance with respect of these requests, please let me know. Please use the address supplied for correspondence. I look forward to hearing from you,

1. You asked at Reference A for briefing for Lord Trefgarne's meeting with Lord Hill-Norton on 2 October. I attach a piece covering the questions posed by Lord Hill-Norton in his letter of 26 July. I believe this adequately covers the broader issues and I see no need for further background briefing. However I attach a specific piece on the "RAF Woodbridge/Bentwaters" incident in which Lord Hill-Norton has previously shown an interest.

2. I would suggest that Minister is supported at the meeting by Hd of Sec(AS) and representatives of D Air Def and DSTI. I would also like to attend myself if you have no objection. I understand that Minister will wish to run through the brief prior to the meeting itself and that we should therefore meet at 14.30 on Wednesday 2 Oct. I should be grateful if you would let us know the venue in due course.

MEETING BETWEEN MINISTER(DS) AND LORD HILL-NORTON

UFOs

I accept that there are strange phenomena to be seen in the a. sky, however I believe there to be adequate explanations for them. Experience has shown that most reported sightings can be attributed to things such as aircraft, meteorological balloons or natural phenomena like ball lightning. Of course there are many other equally straightforward explanations. However, there are a small number of cases where a simple explanation cannot be found immediately and on these occasions we are careful to ensure so far as possible that that they are of no Defence significance. Having satisfied ourselves of this, as you know, we do not attempt any further investigations. Clearly some reports remain unexplained but we have found no evidence that these phenomena represent a threat to national security and therefore cannot justify devoting Defence resources to their investigation.

b. All reports received by the MOD are channelled through Sec(AS)2. They are passed to the Air Staff who examine them for Air Defence implications. In some cases, where (on the face of it) there could be a defence interest, enquiries are made of relevant radar establishments etc in order to obtain more information. All reports are also passed to the Defence Intelligence organisation who have a keen interest in any sightings of unusual objects. We have no specialist group in Whitehall or anywhere else involved in UFO's and no civilian advisers other than Sec(AS)2 are involved.

The Flying Complaints Flight at Rudloe Manor are concerned with receiving and investigating flying complaints. In the course of their duties they occasionally receive UFO reports (as do many other units) but they have no specific role with regard to this subject.

Secretariat (Air Staff) is the Division which provides secretariat support to CAS and the Air Staff and in this capacity is responsible for correspondence with members of the public and answering PQs etc on many subjects, including UFO's. Sec(AS)2 is the branch which amongst other things handles UFO's, there is no such branch as Air Staff Secretariat 8. You may be thinking of Defence Secretariat 8 which no longer exists and from which Sec(AS) evolved as a result of reorganisation of MOD last January.

c. Many of the UFO reports received in MOD come through Defence establishments, although most of these come originally from members of the public. Very few reports are made by military pilots; for instance, in the last 12 months Sec(AS) has received only two such reports.

d. No central record of radar recordings is kept. Major Air Traffic Control units take recordings as a matter of course, however these are generally destroyed after 30 days. ADGE units do not regularly make recordings although some are occasionally made for specific operational purposes. Relevant radar units are consulted where necessary as part of the normal process of handling UFO reports in order to ascertain whether there is any correlation between a reported sighting and known radar traces.

e. The Department is happy to release what information we have on specific incidents. However we could not justify the effort involved in searching for or collating information of a more general nature.

RAF WOODBRIDGE INCIDENT 27 Dec 80

 \equiv

Col Halt's report of 13 Jan 81 concerns the sighting of unusual lights outside the back gate at RAF Woodbridge by two security patrolmen. Col Halt records what was subsequently reported to him without comment. The 3 patrolmen who went into Rendlesham Forest to investigate what they thought might be a crashed aircraft say they saw a triangular object. It has been suggested that this might have been a piloted vehicle, however in view of its reported size (about 9 feet long and 6 feet high) this was, and still is, considered highly unlikely. Indeed enquiries made both at the time and subsequently failed to reveal any radar trace of anything unusual in the area at the time.

Col Halt also reports on his own investigations at the site of the incident the following day. Once again he draws no conclusions from his findings and, significantly, does not recommend further investigation. Our own view also was that no additional action was required. Later on the night of 29 Dec 80 Col Halt and a number of others saw more unusual lights, but again we have no record of anything untoward being picked up on radar.

I think you will agree that it is highly unlikely that any violation of UK airspace would be heralded by such a display of lights. I think it equally unlikely that any reconnaissance or spying activity would be announced in this way. Overall, we believe that the fact that Col Halt did not report these occurrences to MOD for almost 2 weeks after the event, together with the relatively low key manner in which he handled the matter (given resources available to him) are indicative of the degree of importance in defence terms which should be attached to the incident. He himself took all investigative action which was required. If members of the public feel that for scientific or other reasons, there should be an attempt to establish the cause of what happened, that is for them, but I am confident that it is not something in which the MOD should or need become further involved.

Unexplained Lights

Early in the morning of 27 Dec 80 (approximately 0300L), two USAF 1. security police patrolmen saw unusual lights outside the back gate at RAF Woodbridge. Thinking an aircraft might have crashed or been forced down, they called for permission to go outside the gate to investigate. The on-duty flight chief responded and allowed three patrolmen to proceed on foot. The individuals reported seeing a strange glowing object in the forest. The object was described as being metalic in appearance and triangular in shape, approximately two to three meters across the base and approximately two meters high. It illuminated the entire forest with a white light. The object itself had a pulsing red light on top and a bank(s) of blue lights underneath. The object was hovering or on legs. As the patrolmen approached the object, it maneuvered through the trees and disappeared. At this time the animals on a nearby farm went into a frenzy. The object was briefly sighted approximately an hour later near the back gate.

The next day, three depressions 1 1/2" deep and 7" in diameter were 2. found where the object had been sighted on the ground. The following night (29 Dec 80) the area was checked for radiation. Beta/gamma readings of 0.1 milliroentgens were recorded with peak readings in the three depressions and near the center of the triangle formed by the depressions. A nearby tree had moderate (.05-.07) readings on the side of the tree toward the depressions.

3. Later in the night a red sun-like light was seen through the trees. It moved about and pulsed. At one point it appeared to throw off glowing particles and then broke into five separate white objects and then disappeared. Immediately thereafter, three star-like objects were noticed in the sky, two objects to the north and one to the south, all of which were about 10° off the horizon. The objects moved rapidly in sharp angular movements and displayed red, green and blue lights. The objects to the north appeared to be elliptical through an 8-12 power lens. They then turned to full circles. The objects to the north remained in the sky for an hour or more. The object to the south was visible for two or three hours and beamed down a stream of light from time to time. Numerous individuals, including the undersigned, witnessed the activities in paragraphs 2 and 3.

UNIDENTIFIED FLYING OBJECTS - MEETING WITH LORD HILL-NORTON: THURSDAY 10 OCTOBER 1985

You were very kindly present when Lord Trefgarne met Lord Hill-Norton at 11 am at UKLF on Thursday 10 October to discuss Unidentified Flying Objects.

Lord Trefgarne opened the discussion by explaining that there was a central secretariat within the Ministry of Defence, part of whose responsibility was to act as a focal point for the report of unidentified sightings. Their task was to consider whether there were any defence implications from such reports.

Lord Hill-Norton emphasised that he believed quite sincerely that there was a problem of UFOs. He had considered for a number of years that the MOD's response to reported sightings had been unsatisfactory.

Specifically he cited the incident at Woodbridge in 1980 and criticised the alleged refusal by MOD to acknowledge the presence of Lieutenant Colonel Halt's report for $2\frac{1}{2}$ years. He referred to a number of papers released in the United States under the Freedom of Information Act which had been carefully examined in the United States, and which he considered would be of interest to the MOD. He also referred to a book due to the published shortly which is anticipated to be critical of the MOD in this area.

Lord Trefgarne repeated that none of the reported sightings examined had proved to have any defence implications. He did not wish to appear unhelpful, however, and he undertook to consider whether any steps could be taken to allay the concerns of those like Lord Hill-Norton.

Thank you for your letter of 17th July about our correspondence on the UFO question. I would greatly welcome an off-therecord talk with you. Parliament rises on Tuesday, but I would be delighted to come up to London at any mutually convenient date during August when you have had time to consider this letter and to take any further briefing from officials which you think might be useful. (Perhaps your office would care to be in touch with me by telephone at my home address Tel:

It may be helpful if I list the questions which I, at any rate, would like to explore. I know you will understand that I do not ask them frivolously or without a good deal of careful thought about the evidence - or supposed evidence - which appears to exist for a persistent phenomenon which, as I see it at present, cannot be wholly without Defence significance. I need hardly add that if there were sensitive Defence questions at issue, I would be the last to press them in public.

The ground which I hope we might cover in an informal a discussion is indicated by the following questions:

Does the Ministry of Defence acknowledge - by way of reports from the public, the civil police, the Civil Aviation Authority, other civil authorities or its own establishments - that traces are obtained from time to time of the intrusion into British airspace (and sometimes territory) of phenomena for which no prosaic explanation can be given? (I should add that although I am always willing to be disuaded, the evidence accumulated by civilian researchers for the persistence of some such phenomena - amounting on occasion to apparently structured 'vehicles' - seems to me at present overwhelming. I shall be glad to give you instances. The events reported by Lt. Col. Halt of the United States Air Force in a report to your Department dated 13th January 1981 are among them).



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
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Assuming, as I hope, that the Ministry of Defence does not ignore the reports reaching it (and we have been told in reply to Parliamentary questions that they amount to some hundreds a year from civilian sources alone), what steps are taken by the Department to investigate them? In particular:-

- i) Are they dealt with solely <u>ad hoc</u>, using routine staff channels? or is there some specialist group, either within the Whitehall establishment or elsewhere, which is charged with taking an expert view? If so, to whon do they report? And what is their composition? Do they include civilian advisers from outside your Department?
- ii) What part is played, if any, by the Flying Complaints Flight at RAF Rudloe Manor?
- iii) What part, if any, is played by Air Staff Secretariats 2 & 8?
 - How many of the reports of unusual phenomena have been received from Defence establishments, including reports from the pilots of military aircraft?
- What material does your Department have of traces left on military radar or in photographic form either from sorties by military aircraft or from ground-based or ship-based facilities?
- Can any such material be released either to me or to responsible persons outside your Department for purposes of scientific study?

In troubling you with these questions I am well aware that their subject matter has often been thought easy to ridicule, especially when associated with some of the wilder notions which ar current among the civilian research groups. I am not wedded to any particular theory myself. I do, on the other hand, believe that there is overwhelming evidence for a persistent phenomenon of a highly unusual character. This is, at the least, of considerable scientific interest; and I have not yet heard anything from your Department which convinces me that it is wholly without Defence significance. I would be reassured to know either that it is being adequately gripped as a Defence matter (and, if so, by precisely what means) or that material held by your Department can be release








to serious civilian researchers under arrangements which do not impose unacceptable administrative burdens.

Thank you again for the offer of a discussion. I look forward to our talk.



PS. I ought perhaps to let you know that Aubrey Buxton is currently considering the possibility of an extended programme on Anglia Television dealing, among other things, with the incidents reported to your Department by Lt. Col. Halt, which were the subject of my letter to the Defence Secretary.





As you will see from Reference A (copy attached), Lord 1. Trefgarne has agreed to meet Lord Hill-Norton to discuss UFO's. Arrangements have been made for the meeting to take place on 25 September 1985 at 15.00 in the House. Sec(AS) will be represented at the meeting and we see considerable advantage in having further support from yourselves. Would you please let me know whether you would be willing to attend.

MEETING BETWEEN US of S(AF) AND LORD HILL-NORTON

UFOs

I accept that there are strange phenomena to be seen in the a. sky, however I believe there to be adequate explanations for them. Experience has shown that most reported sightings can be attributed to things such as aircraft, meteorological balloons or natural phenomena like ball lightning. Of course there are many other equally straightforward explanations. However, there are a small number of cases where a simple explanation cannot be found jên de immediately and on these occasions we are careful to ensure that they are of no Defence significance. Having satisfied ourselves of this, as you know, we do not attempt any further investigations. Clearly some reports remain unexplained but we have found no evidence that these phenomena represent a threat to national security and therefore cannot justify devoting Defence resources to their investigation.

b. All reports received by the MOD are channelled through Sec(AS)2. They are passed to the Air Staff who examine them for Air Defence implications. In some cases, where (on the face of it) there could be a defence interest, enquiries are made of relevant radar establishments etc in order to obtain more information. All reports are also passed to the Defence Intelligence organisation who have a keen interest in any sightings of unusual objects. We have no specialist group in Whitehall or anywhere else involved in UFO's and other them for Air



The Flying Complaints Flight at Rudloe Manor are concerned with receiving and investigating flying complaints. In the course of their duties they occasionally receive UFO reports (as do many other units) but they have no specific role with regard to this subject.


Secretariat (Air Staff) is the Division which provides secretariat support to CAS and the Air Staff and in this capacity is responsible for correspondence with members of the public and answering PQs etc on many subjects, including UFO's. Sec(AS)2 is the branch which amongst other things handles UFO's, there is no such branch as Air Staff Secretariat 8. You may be thinking of Defence Secretariat 8 which no longer exists and from which Sec(AS) evolved as a result of reorganisation of MOD last January.

c. Many of the UFO reports received in MOD come through Defence establishments, although most of these come originally from members of the public. Very few reports are made by military pilots; for instance, in the last 12 months Sec(AS) has received only one such report.


1. The report at reference (A) of an unidentified flying object 1.5 miles southeast of Glenavy Northern Ireland warranted investigation, primarily regarding the security implications, secondly to try to ascertain the cause of the aerial phenonema.

2. We have been advised that there were no reports of any terrorist incidents during the period in question.

3. RAF Aldergrove has informed us that there were no fixed wing aircraft in area at the date and time stated.

4. Two rotary wing movements occurred within 5 minutes either side of the reported sighting. Firstly a Gazelle departed Aldergrove at 1640Z en route to the southeast. Secondly a Wessex en route from Lisburn landed at Aldergrove at 1655Z.

Thank you for your report of an unusual sighting you witnessed on 21 December 1989, which has been passed to the Ministry of Defence for reply.

You may find it helpful if I begin by explaining that while the Ministry of Defence does receive and co-ordinate some reports of UFO sightings, our sole concern is to determine whether or not they present a threat to the security of the United Kingdom. Unless we judge that they do, and this has not been the case so far, we do not attempt to investigate further or identify what might have been seen.

Given this limited involvement with the subject, the Ministry of Defence does not have any department which is appointed solely for the purpose of studying UFO reports, nor do we have any staff employed on the subject full time. As you will expect, therefore, we do not carry out studies, investigations or surveys into the phenomena. I am sure you will appreciate that defence funds are already fully committed to maintaining the security of the UK, and this being so, we could not justify the use of funds on scientific investigations, unless a clear threat to security had been identified.

Nontheless, it is clear from the reports we receive that many strange things have been observed in the sky, although we believe that rational explanations could be found for most of them. Possibilities include satellite debris re-entering the earth's atmosphere, ball lightning, unusual cloud formations, meteorological balloons, aircraft lights, aircraft at unusual angles or a host of other things. In this case, however, I have ascertained that significant helicopter activity did take place in the vicinity of Aldergrove Airport on the date, and at the approximate time of your sighting. It is highly possible that what you saw was helicopter movements taking place in the area.



I am writing concerning your Freedom of Information request regarding the number of UFO sightings that have been reported over the Merseyside area in the last five years. Your request has been passed to this Department as we are the focal point within the Ministry of Defence for correspondence regarding UFOs.

First, it may be helpful if I explain that the Ministry of Defence examines any reports of 'unidentified flying objects' it receives solely to establish whether what was seen might have some defence significance; namely, whether there is any evidence that the United Kingdom's airspace might have been compromised by hostile or unauthorised air activity. Unless there is evidence of a potential threat to the United Kingdom from an external source, and to date no 'UFO' report has revealed such evidence, we do not attempt to identify the precise nature of each sighting reported to us. We believe that rational explanations, such as aircraft lights or natural phenomena, could be found for them if resources were diverted for this purpose, but it is not the function of the MOD to provide this kind of aerial identification service. It would be an inappropriate use of defence resources if we were to do so.

With regard to the number of UFO sightings that have been reported to the MOD in the last five years, from the area of Merseyside, I have examined our database and found six reports. The details are as follows.

25/10/2002	01:30	Liverpool	Merseyside	Object looked like an upturned saucer, with a dome on top. It had amber lights and the dome had a light on top of it. Was hovering.
15/11/2002	21:30	Liverpool	Merseyside	A series of eight to ten lights all tracing a pattern in the sky.

11/04/2004	20:43	Seaforth	Merseyside	Saw a UFO, with a cluster of four, bright lights in a ring shape on it. Three beams of light shone upwards and then disappeared.

MOD files were routinely destroyed after 5 years until 1967 when they were generally preserved for The National Archives. A few have survived before 1967 and these together with records up to 1977 are now available for public viewing. 

We believe that rational explanations, such as aircraft lights or natural phenomena, could be found for them if resources were diverted for this purpose, but it is not the function of the MOD to provide this kind of aerial identification service. It would be an inappropriate use of defence resources if we were to do so.

With regard to the records the MOD holds on reported UFO sightings, I should inform you that they are not held electronically, but are filed on paper files in the order in which they are received and we currently hold records spanning a 25 year period. They are not segregated by geographical area. To identify records specifically for Sussex over the period 1997 to the present date, would require a manual search, and these records would also have to be redacted of personal information. The costs to do this would exceed the permitted £600 cost limit set for compliance with the Freedom of Information Act, and as provided by Section 12 of the Act, therefore, the Ministry of Defence is not obliged to comply with your request.

Turning to the second part of your request, the MoD is not funded to carry out research into UFO's, alien or extraterrestrial life. Two civilian staff are employed to record UFO sightings reported to the MoD, respond to public and parliamentary correspondence and answer other requests for information. 





I am writing concerning your Freedom of Information request regarding the number of reported sightings of 'unidentified flying objects' in or near Merthyr Tydfil and the Rhymney Valley in South Wales, in 2005 and 2006 and the costs incurred in the recording and investigating of these sightings. Your request has been passed to this Department as we are the focal point within the Ministry of Defence for correspondence regarding UFOs.

First, it may be helpful if I explain that the Ministry of Defence examines any reports of 'unidentified flying objects' it receives solely to establish whether what was seen might have some defence significance; namely, whether there is any evidence that the United Kingdom's airspace might have been compromised by hostile or unauthorised air activity. Unless there is evidence of a potential threat to the United Kingdom from an external source, and to date no 'UFO' report has revealed such evidence, we do not attempt to identify the precise nature of each sighting reported to us. We believe that rational explanations, such as aircraft lights or natural phenomena, could be found for them if resources were diverted for this purpose, but it is not the function of the MOD to provide this kind of aerial identification service. It would be an inappropriate use of defence resources if we were to do so.

I have examined our records for reports of UFO sightings in Merthyr Tydfil and the Rhymney Valley, but there were no reports for the years 2005 and 2006. Statistics for the number of sightings over Wales and the UK for the period of 2005-2006 are shown below.

United Kingdom	2005 - 147	2006 - 95
Wales	2005 - 11	2006 - 1

The MOD does not keep records identifying the costs of recording and investigating UFO reports.

Finally, you may wish to be aware that there is some information about UFOs available for public viewing. MOD files were routinely destroyed after 5 years until 1967 when they were generally preserved for The National Archives. A few have survived before 1967 and together with records

up to 1977 are now available for public viewing. The National Archives can be contacted at Ruskin Avenue, Richmond, Surrey TW9 4DU or telephone, 020 8876 3444. 

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

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

Once again, I wish you luck with your studies.



Thank you for your letter of 26th July.

Perhaps I might add to my letter of 15th July that a recent crop circle occurrence near Spaldwick, Cambridgeshire, which we think can be dated to the night of 27/28 July, seems to have been of close interest to a Nimrod aircraft (possibly of No. 51 Squadron), which made five low passes across it shortly after sunset on Monday 29th July. We have other anecdotal evidence of what seems to be more than casual interest in these events by military aircraft.

I am, again, writing not to complain but to express the readiness of CCCS to contribute to any government research which is being understaken. Our own aerial surveys of these events, coupled with our field research, indicate some strongly energetic local effects of an unusual kind both before and after crop formations have occurred.

We believe these events are of importance. We would welcome (with suitable discretion) your confirmation that government research is in train. I repeat CCCS's offer to contribute to serious study of the phenomenon.



My predecessor wrote to you on 26 July, with an interim reply to your letter of 15 July 1991 to the Under-Secretary of State for the Armed Forces. I am now able to provide the substantive reply that you were promised.

I should state at the outset that the Ministry of Defence has no interest in crop circles, and is conducting no research or investigations into this phenomenon. You mentioned the involvement of the Army Air Corps, and Clearly, there have been instances of individuals taking photographs of crop circles, but this has only occurred during routine training flights. Individuals are entirely free to pursue their personal interests either in their own time, or in a manner that is consistent with Service regulations. There can be no question of MOD resources being used to support investigation of the crop circle phenomenon.

You also mentioned that a Chinook helicopter was in the Beckhampton-Marlborough area on the night of July 11. I can confirm that a Chinook was in the area at the time, but can assure you that it was conducting a standard training sortie. Its presence in the area was unconnected with crop circles, and there is no question of our having any theory about the formation of crop circles, or indeed any pool of information on the phenomenon.

I hope this is helpful, although I realise it is not the response that you were hoping for. I should like to take this opportunity to wish you and the Centre for Crop Circle Studies luck with your investigations.



1. Thank you for the opportunity to contribute to the debate on service involvement in corn circle investigations.

2. I am unaware of any instances in which the RN has helped investigators by taking aerial photographs of these circles and I very much doubt whether any such requests have been received. However, I feel that I would have some difficulty persuading the Navy that they should not co-operate where possible on the basis of the advice contained in reference B.

Are we not being over-sensitive towards the UFO lobby 3. here? While our long standing policy of not devoting time or resources to investigating UFO reports is without guestion sensible, there is surely a need to draw a distinction between bizarre and unconfirmable reports of incidents which probably never occurred and a mildly interesting natural phenomenon the existence of which is patently obvious. It 🐃 seems odd that we should impose an artificial constraint on servicemen to avoid any association with crop circles simply because of the antics of the lunatic fringe. After all, as your guidelines stipulate, there is no harm in providing assistance where this does not involve the expenditure of extra time or effort. I am quite happy to see RN helicopters overflying these objects should they be asked to do so and intend to register no objection should any requests come my way.

1. Thank you for your minute at Reference in which you set out the position with regard to Army involvement into the investigation of corn circles.

2. The fact that photographs have been taken from Army Air Corps helicopters puts us in a difficult position, even if this was done during routine training flights. The MOD's position with regard to UFOs is that we do not devote time or resources to investigation of such reports, unless an incident has any defence significance. For the AAC to involve themselves in this way erodes this position, as the UFO lobby will see this as active investigation of UFO-related activity (as they view corn circles) - something that we have categorically and publicly stated that we do not do.

3. I would be grateful if you would have a look at this, and give some thought to whether it would be possible to steer the AAC away from getting involved with the investigation of corn circles.

4. Of course, none of this would in any way prevent AAC personnel getting involved in their own time, provided that Service/MOD resources were not used.

5. I would be grateful for your rapid advice, as I believe we should ensure that our policy is consistent before we reply to the letter from the Centre for Crop Circle Studies.

6. I am copying this minute to Sec(NS), who may wish to ensure that Naval helicopters are not similarly involved.

1. Thank you for your minute Sec(AS)12/3 of 1 August.

2. Frankly I am reluctant to start firing off edicts about what AAC pilots can and can't do when they spot corn circles beneath their helicopters - I am pretty sure that I wouldn't be taken seriously if I did.

3. I think it is already generally accepted that MOD resources must not be used specifically in pursuit of personal interests. I do not, however, see that the act of taking photographs of corn circles during routine training flights - which incidentally frequently entail maintaining a low hover in a chosen position consumes any additional resources whatsoever. Neither do I see any difficulty in such photographs being made available to organisations concerned with solving the mystery, provided no impression was given that they formed any part of an official MOD investigations.

1. Further to Reference A, I attach a short piece provided by the Army Air Corps on the involvement of LT Col (Retd)

2. You will note that Lt Col **Constant** interest was entirely personal and was originally sparked by a routine low flying complaint from a local farmer. Though a report of was made to MOD I suspect that this was solely on Lt Col **Constant** own initiative.

3. I have not attempted to verify the claim that a pilot from 658 Sqn took pictures of corn circles - I am sure we can take Mr word for it. I imagine that this is just another example of an AAC pilot taking a personal interest in the phenomenon.

4. I agree with your suggested line of reply (Reference B, paragraph 4), but you might consider developing it along the following lines.

MOD has no interest in the corn circles phenomenon and therefore has nothing to offer in the way of information exchange. However, as they have done in the past, individuals in the Services are free to pursue their personal interests either in their own time or in a manner that is consistent with normal training objectives. If, for example, Army Air Corps pilots take photographs of corn circles during routine training flights they would be entirely free to share the results with organisations concerned with solving the mystery. Nor would MOD object to such organisations cultivating their existing individual contacts with the Services, provide it was understood that no MOD resources could be made available for the sole purpose of corn circle research.

<u>CIRCLES IN THE CORN</u> INVOLVMENT OF LT COL (RETD)

In 1985 Lt Col **Control of** then SO1 STANDARDS/NIGHT SAFETY HQ DAAC, was contacted by a local farmer asking what the AAC had been doing to his corn. Taking the Technical Accident Investigation Officer (AIFSO) with him he visited the area which was about 2 miles from Middle Wallop. It turned out to be a perfect set of circles in the corn.

Neither he nor the AIFSO could find any sensible explanation for the rings accept to state categorically that it was nothing to do with helicopters. Col **Control** submitted a factual report to MOD, accompanied by good photographs, stating what they saw and their inability to explain it.

A local man, Mr Colin Andrews (author of Circles in the Corn) a member of a group who had been investigating the circles for some years, also turned up on the scene. He invited Col **Constant** to attend a meeting at which any theories could be put forward for the meeting to shoot down. Col was asked to attend as a helicopter agent to debate the inevitable "It's HELICOPTERS" theories. This he did and found the meeting to be very sensible and level headed. He told the chairman the ghist of his report.

Col **Constant**became intrigued and that year, 1985, passed the word round to UK based AAC units to let him know if they saw any circles and give him the Grid Ref. There were one or two responses and then interest waiwed.

Col **Constant** was subsequently approached by BBC TV Pebble Mill, who were making a film about the circles, to again be the helicopter agent and debate the helicopter theories. This he did, and laid on a demonstration with a helicopter in long grass to conclusively illustrate the facts. This was all filmed and shown on TV. Lt Col **Constant** continues to take an inactive interest in the circles and would be delighted to be given a satisfactory explanation for them.


1. Thank you for your minute 12/3 of 17 July.

1. I attach a copy of Reference A, which has been passed onto Sec(AS) by US of S (AF)'s office for answer.


2. I would be grateful if **GS Sec** could provide advice on the first paragraph of the second page of Mr **Control** letter, especially regarding the claims of Army co-operation with crop circle researchers, the use of Army helicopters to photograph the phenomena and Lt Col **Control** report to MoD. You will recall your earlier advice at Reference B in response to a letter by a **Control** which refuted his claim that the Army was assisting with crop circle investigations.

3. Could Hels 2 provide advice regarding Mr report of a Chinook in the Beckhampton - Marlborough area from 23.30 hours on the night of 11 July ?

4. I intend to answer Mr **control** in the terms we normally use for UFO correspondents - saying that the MoD has no official interest in corn circles, and that we could not justify the use of Defence funds on scientific (or other) investigations, unless a clear threat to the security of the UK had been identified.

5. However, I do not wish to give the impression that MoD is in any way 'covering up' anything, and for that reason I would like to add that there is no reason why MoD or Service personnel should not become involved in corn circle research in their spare time as long as MoD resources were not used in this activity. PL(LS)L1, AG Sec 1c and S10f(Air) may wish to comment on this line.

6. US of S(AF)'s office have asked that a reply be sent to Mr by 30 July and could I therefore have your inputs by 26 July, please ?



I am writing on behalf of the Centre for Crop Circle Studies (CCCS) to enquire whether we can be of any assistance to your own studies of the interesting phenomenon of the unexplained disturbances which have been appearing in fields of crops in recent years, particularly in the south west of the country.

The presence of an Army Chinook helicopter in the area of Beckhampton-Marlborough, Wiltshire, for a susbstantial period from about 23.30 hours last Thursday, 11th July, flying at very low level and on at least one occasion using its searchlight, indicates that you may have a hypothesis about the causation of the crop circle events to which we could usefully contribute from our own studies.

You may by now have received complaints from local residents about this prolonged intrusion at a late hour. My own purpose in writing is not, however, to make a complaint but to register CCCS's interest.

The Centre was founded early in 1990 to conduct systematic research into the puzzling sequence of events which, as you will know, first came under scientific study by Dr. G. Terence Meaden in 1980. Several of us have felt that Dr. Meaden's attempts (with the recent assistance of Japanese scientists) to formulate the model of an unusual atmospheric vortex which might account for the crop circle formations have failed to produce more than, at best, a partial answer. CCCS's explicit aim is to broaden the scope of research. Following the establishment of several research panels last autumn, we are making a degree of progress. We would like nothing better than to pool our information with any data which is being collected by government organisations.

We are currently in cordial (though discreet) relations with the local police in Wiltshire, whose own aerial surveys of the crop circle events are adding to our knowledge. It might be of value both to us, as a learned society, and to you, as a Department with public responsibilities, if we could exchange information with you on some mutually agreeable basis.

There is a precedent for this kind of collaboration. In August 1987 a pilot of No. 658 Squadron, Army Air Corps, Netheravon, took some excellent aerial photographs of crop circles near Westbury, Wiltshire. Thanks to the courtesy of the Army Air Corps, these were made available to a research organisation which preceeded CCCS and have since been published. The same organisation and other civilian researchers had held a useful conference at Alresford, Hampshire, in October 1985, which was attended by Lt.Col. **Constant** of Middle Wallop. A report made to the MOD by Lt.Col. **Constant** was very helpfully placed on the public record and has also since been published.

These early steps towards an exchange of information do not, unfortunately, seem to have been followed up by the organisation concerned. CCCS believes that it might be fruitful to resume them, particularly at local level, and particularly in Wiltshire, where many events are currently occurring.

I and other members of my Council are at the Department's disposal if a discussion seems useful to you.

A thorough search was undertaken in 2004 to identify all the UFO related files to ensure we had a full file list and an idea of where all the files were located. This was, in part, brought about due to a number of requests (pre-FOI) for crop circle information. This search revealed no record of there ever having been a file created on crop circles.

It is of course possible that the file was created, but that it was later destroyed, without any record of either activity. However, I must say that I view this as highly unlikely given that it was allegedly one of the UFO files, and MoD policy is to retain all these files for public interest. The file is not held by this office, and not held in archive.

From time to time, the MoD receives requests for information on the subject of crop circles. Such correspondence is held on our usual UFO Correspondence files in date order. More recently, these requests are filed on our FOI files. Any attempt to locate crop circle information therefore requires a manual search of our old files, which is time consuming and, depending on the time period to be covered, quite likely to exceed £600.


