The disc generally is $10^{\prime \prime}$ thick and at the point where the domes are located about 14" in thickness. There is an object on it similar to electric coil mich has some type of an arm on it and bears the words "Inspected TS". Some of the wiring has been burred off and it looks as though something might be missing.

At 11:55 P. M., July 11, I took a phone call from of the Laurel, Maryland, Police Department. Sergeant Said that he had examined the "flying disc:" He said that it had been made from a Gulf Oil sign and the top of a garbage can and had been painted with aluminum paint. It had been recently painted because the paint was still wet. Attached to it were a dry cell battery, a flashlight bulb, sone wires and a buzzer. He asked if the Bureau was sending anyone out to look at it. I told him that me were not, that we had referred the matter to the Army, and suggested that he call them.

I subsequently telephoned Captain $\square$ the Duty Officer at G-2, and passed on to him the information furnished by Sergeant Lenis.

 Officer with the Civilian Air Patrol, Black River Falls, Wisconsin. Colonel

bat Black River Falls, Wisconsin, had found a large 17" disc which appeared to have been possibly made out of cardboard painted with silver airplane dope. In the center was a tube and a small motor with a propellor attached to the side. Colonel expressed the opinion that this disc would not be able to fly by itself. He advised it would be taken to the Air Corps Headquarters. Colonel advised, however, that did not want to release the disc without FBI approval.

I instructed Mr . Johnson to advise the Air Corps officer to get in touch with colonel and tell him he saw no reason for the Bureau to attempt to secure the release of the material since it was not in our custody and we had no control. He stated the press was also calling concerning this matter. I instructed him to make no comment to the press.

For the Bureau's information, United Press and Associated Press telephoned me at dy residence about three or four times between 1:00 A. $\mathrm{H}_{*}$ and 2:30 A. M., July, 7, 1947. The United Press representative informed me that Father JOSEPMBRASHY had stated on interview by a silwauke Sentinel reporter, one BIIL NELKS, (Phonetic) that he, Father BRASKY, was going to call the FBI concerning the contraption, which apparently was identical with one of the flying discs recently publicized throughout the country. The United Press representative desired to know if we had any statement to make on the matter. I informed him that I had no official comment, other than "No Comment."

Since I have contacted the United Press representative on various occasions, I asked him what the actual details were, and he stated he did not know except that the interview of the priest reflected that a circular saw had been found with some devices attached to it.

The Associated Press called me shortly after the United Press representative did, and on being advised that I had no comment to make concerning the story, I asked the Associated Press representafive what the actual facts were, and he informed me that as far as the Associated Press was concerned, the facts were that a circular saw had been found and a story had been obtained from a priest who had been drinking quite heavily. The Associated Press representative informed me that apparently the United Press desired to get a statement from me denying or affirming that the FBI was investigating the matter. I informed the Associated Press representative that apparently someone was suffering under a misinterpretation of any comment I had made, and possibly some reporter was in an ombarmassing position if a story had gone out over the wide services on $0,-4384$

I then to lophoned the knifed, Press representative, who apparently in the meantime had been called by the Associated Press in an offort to straighten out the United Press. No reference was made to the FDI in the kilyraukoo Sentinel article appearing July 7, 1947, but the Milwaukee Journal article, which is attached, reformed to an alleged statement by Father BRASKY that he attompted to cot in touch with an FBI Agent whom he knows. Tries to Call FBIMEn
Father Brasky sald he did not bother to show the disk to eny of bis parishioners Sunday. He tried to telephone an F'BI agent whom he knows, but was unable to reach him Sunday, he added. Asked whether it could have been the work of a practical joker, Father Brasky replied: "Could be. I don't know."
The disk; apparently of steel, had 8 one and inree-eightin inch boie in the center. Through it ran lew wires. To each end of the cluster of wires was attached what looked llke a small condenser about three inches long. The condenserlike objects were wrapped in black tape which still was sticky. The disk was greasy and $\quad 0 \mathrm{mewhat} \mathrm{dirty}$. Stamped on It was: "Approved, Duniap."
Father Brasky deelined to pay with the disk. He showed anumber of items in his trinket collection. All of them had momething to do with fishlng, Father Brasky's favorite sport. New York, N. Y. - The llying naucers may be explained by certain lawn of eyesight.

All objects appear $r$ ound or nearly so at any distance close to the limit of how far a perion can tee.

If the objecta are eeen by reflected light, as in mont casen reported, they are almont certain to be round, and if the reflections are eunlight then the sizes reported are those which would be expected from diatent light reflections.

Descriptions of virtually all the saucers en round and flat fit exactly with the tricks that eyes play Thin tricitiness varies with differencer in weather and lightIng.

This writer has soen tlying saucers over Long Island sound, not only this year but in previous years. They were round, bright and moving tast. But they were no mystery because they were light reflected from the bodies of airplanes that soon identified themselves by changing course and coming near enough to be aeen distinctly.
ments of the flying atucers fit with the common maneuvert of airplanes, ingly or in groups. Some of the maneuvering reported, which took saucers out of aight and back into sight again, resembles what can be seen wile watching distant airplanes.

## Quirks of Eyesight May Explain Disc Mystery

NEW YORK, July 6-( $A^{\prime}$ )-Certain laws of human eyesight will explain much of what has been described about the flying saucers reported from nearly all parts of the Unilted states.

If the thing ts seen by refiected ught, as in most cases reported it is almost certain to be round; and If the reflections are sunlight, then the sixes reported are those which would be expected from distant light reflections.

The one outstanding tact ebout virtually all the asucers is that they had no etructure - they seemed merely round and flat. That description fits exactly with the tricks that eyes play. Thls trickIness varies with differences in weather and lighting.

NOT A MYBTERY

## SPEED MYSTERY

There is no explanation for reported speeds of 1,000 or more mples an hour. Meteors, although they go much faster than that, do not explain it because the saucers mostiy appear in daytime and there are not enough dayHght meteors.
Ice crystals forming iftle round clouda have been suggested. But these fall to fit in most chaes because the lee crystals form at altitudes which are higher than most of the saucer reported.

Nothing published in ecience or atomic studies gives the slightest clue to flying saucers unleas the objecta are aircraft.

One ecientlat today mald that at least lot of eaucers are explained by the force of aggestion which causes a person to say to himself:
"Oh, ter, I woe it too."

At 10:45 a. II., July 7, 1947, I talked to SAC Johnson of the whlwakee office concerning the United Press item appearing in the Washington Post for Monday, July 7, with reference to a flying disc or flying saucer, allegedly reported to the Kimaukee Office by Reverend Joseph Brasky of St. Joseph's Church, Grafton, Wisconsin.

SAC Johnson advised that the Associated Press and the Undiéed Press between the hours 1:00 and 6:00 arm. today had made inquiry of him as to whether anything had been reported to the Milwaukee offices fie decisned to comment. He stated as a matter of fact the priest had not made any contact with him, and he learned from the Associated Press that the priest was intoxicated and as far as the Associated Press was concerned they were not releasing the story because all that was involved was a circular saw. 4 . Johnson stated the Milwaukee Sentinel apparently sent the report out and that they handled United Press service. He stated a photograph of the priest was in this $\bar{m}$ saw which apparently covers the body of the priest from arm pit to ard pit. Attached to the saw are several wires and two small tubes described as about three inches long and one inch in diameter. The news item in the Milwaukee Sentinel indicates it was believed some prankster had thrown it into the yard, perhaps with a firecracker attached. Jr. Johnson stated the Milwaukee Sentinel had stated the priest would make a report of this matter today to the milwaukee Office. I instructed SAC johnson in the event the priest made a report to furnish details of the reportinmediately, but in view of the nature of the information in his possession, no inquiry should be conducted at the present.

While they were dis ousting whet hrs. ten minutes later all three save ten similar objects proceeding rapidly in the same direction in the form of a triangle. As the group of objects was disappearing, three of the objects on the left flank peeled off and proceeded in a more northerly direction. The remaining objects appeared to close ranks and, proceeded in a northeasterly direction.

From three to five minutes later these same individuals saw another group of three objects proceeding in the same direction, and again in the shape of a triangle. From three to five minutes later all three observed another group in a triangular formation consisting of five or six objects. They were proceeding in the same direction.

A fer minutes later the three persons eave a large group of objects estimated at from thirty-five to fifty flying in a triangular formation in the same direction. Approximately twenty or twenty-five minutes after the large group of objects was observed, similar objects were noted coming back over the city in a southwesterly direction. These objects were generally in groups of three, five and seven and followed each other at approximately five minute intervale.

On the night in question the sky was overcast and the objects could not be seen closely; however; they were distinct enough so that all porsons could observe what they described as a glow going through the air. They said that the objects appeared to be lighted from the inside and were of a color similar to regular electric lights.

Detective band Ifr both statod that they could not be meteors or comets, that they flew on a level line and did not appear to drop. They flen at a terrific rate of speed and were visible for only a few $b / C$ minutes at a time. Both persons interviewed said that the objects could not have beon geese or ducks and that the lights were not e rerlection of the city lights on some object or objects.

None of the persons interviemed noticed any flames or anything except the glow of lights. None of the persons who claired to have seen these objects were drinking at the time. No other persons in Twin Falls reported seeing the objects mentioned herein; however, wr. Wand Mr. Dotad that it p/ $7 C$ was purely by accident that they had seen the objects and that they vould not have seen them unless they were looking for them, because of the speed at which they travolod. On acoount of the ovorcast aky they wore unable to satimato the gize of the objeots or the height at which they flew.

No further investigation is being conducted by the Butte office, and the case is being closed.

To nut all of the statements made by in this report would make it a voluminous volume. However, after having; checked on aeronautical map of the area over which man claims that he saw tie objects it was jetarmincd that all statements made by -in regard to the distances involved, sped of the objects, course n! the objects end si ?p of the objects, could very possibly be facts. The distances mentioned s :- in his report are within a short distance $o^{\circ}$ the actual dislimn on acronnutical charts of this area, although
bini never consulted aeronautical charts of the type the Army uses. stated that his business had suffered featly since his report on July 2 S due to the fact that at every stop on his husinoss routes, large round of mangle worn waiting, to question hin rs to just what ho had seen. The following, story of what I observed over the Cascade mountains, as impossible as it may som, is positively true. I never asked nor wanted any notoriety for jus h. accidontly being in the right spot ot the right time to observe whit I did. I reported something z the I mow any pilot would hove reported. I don't thin' that in any way ny observation was due to any sensivity of eye si fl's or judgment then what is considered normal for any pilot.

On June 24th, Tuesday, 1547, I hid finished my work for the Ot Chehalis, washington, and at about two o' clock I took off from Chehalis. $\because$ inshington, airport with the intention of going to Yakima, Fash. $\because y$ trip was delayed for en hour to search for a large marine transport that supposedly went down near or around the southwest side of it. Rainier in the state of iesphingtion and to date has never been found.

I flaw directly toward t. Rainier after reaching en altitude of about 9,500 feet, which is the noproximate elevation of the hitch plateau from which :t. Pinier rises. I had made one sweep of this high plateau to the westward, searching; all of tine various rides for this marine ship and flem to the west down nit near the lidice side of the canyon where Ashford, Washington, is located.

Unable to see northing, that looked like the lost ship, I made a 300 degree turn to the right and above the little city of lineal, starting again toward lilt. Rainier. I climbed back un to en altitude of approximately 9,200 feet. The air was so smooth that day then it was a real pleasure flying and,
 altitude, I trimmed out ry airplane in the direction of Yakima, Washington, which was almost directly east of my position and simply sat in my plane observing the sky end the terrain.

There was a $D C-4$ to the left and to the rear of me approximately fifteen miles distance, end I should judge, at 14,000 foot elevation. Tho sky and air was as clear as crystal. I hadn't flown more than two or three minutes on my course when a bright flash reflected on my airplane. It startled me es $I$ thought $I$ mas too close to some other aircraft. I looked every place in the sky and couldn't find where the reflectimon had come from until I looked to that left end the north of 't. Rainier where I observed a chain of nine peculiar looking aircraft flyine from north to south at approximately 9,500 feet elevation and going, seemingly, in a definite direction of about 170 decrees.

They were appronchinf, 't. Rainier very rapidity, and I merely assumed they ware jet planes. Anyhow, I discovered that this was where the refleodion hal come from, es two or three of them every fem seconds would dip or change their course slightly, just enough for the sun to strike them at an angle that reflected brightly on my plans.

T: se objects being, quite fer awe:, I we unable for few seconds to make out their shape or their formation. Very shortly they approached ${ }^{\text {the }}$. Filmier, end I observed their outline erainst the snow quite plainly.

I thought it was very neculiar that I couldn't find their tails but
 sowed, $\mathrm{r}=\mathrm{I}$ had two difinit: mint: I could clock them by; the air was so cl ar thine it was var: easy to sse obincts end determine their approximate shape and size rt almost fifty miles that day.

I urninimer distinctly that my swoon second hand on my eight dry clock, $\boldsymbol{w}^{1}$ itch is loceted on $\because \because$ instrument man], read no minute to 3 P. ${ }^{\prime}$. as the first object of this formation nested the southern ede of lit. Rainier. I watcher these objects with rent intigrest as I had never before observed
airplanes flyire so close to tle momtair tops, flying directly south to southenst dom the hof's bnck of $e$ mountein range. I would estimate their elevation could have porind n thourand fegt ons wa. or another uy or down, lut ther were nrett. much on the hirizon to me milich would indicnte thoy wore mar the seme elevetion ns $I$ was.

They flew like mary tiens I hive observed gecse to fly in a rather diegonel chain-like linn as if the: were linked together. They semed to hold a definite direction but rather swervod in and out of the figh mountain neaks = Their speed at the time did not impress ne farticularly, because I knew that our army and air forces lind planes that want very fast.

That kept botherine me as I vintehed them flip and flash in the sun richt along their path was t'es fret, thet I couldn't make out any tail on them, and I em sure thet eny pilot mould fustify more than a second look at such a plane.

I observed them nuite plainly, and I estimate my distance from them, which was almost at richt ancles, to be between twenty to twenty-five miles. I knex they must be very larfe to observe their shope at that distence, even on as clear a dny ns it was thet Tucsdey. In fact I compared e zeus fastener or corlir: tool I hed in my necket ith - holding it up on then and holiine: it up on the $\mathrm{j}=-4$ - thet 1 could observe ot quite a distance to my left, nuc they seened smiller then the lic-4; but, I should judce their span woulc have been as wion es the furtlercst engines on cach side of the fuselafe of the DC-1.

The nore I obscrvod the se objects, the nore upset 1 beceme, as I am accustoned and fomilier :ith nost all objects flying whether I em close to the cround or at hisher altitudes. I observed the chain of these objects prssing another hirh suon-covered ridee in between it. Rainier and sit. Adams, and as tin first cre res massing the south crest of this ridef the last onject wes enterin: the noriborn or"st of the ridro.

As 7 wes flyire in the diraction of this farticular ridge, I measured it and foond it to be rpprexinetely rive miles so I could safely assune that tie chain of these saucer lif: objocts were at last five ailes lone. I could quito accuratel" doterrino their :nfhrey due to the fact tiat there wero severfl high nonlts bint ere a litile this side of them as wall as hirner pen's on the other side of thinir patheray.

As the lest unit of thit fonntion passed the southern most hish snowcovered crest of tit. Adens, I looked at ry sweep secend hand and it showed thet they liad travelled the distence in rne minute and forty-two seconds. Five ot the time this timing did not upset me es $I$ felt confident after I would land thern would b: some explamition of what 1 saw.

A number of nows reen end expert, suegested thet I might have been seeire, reflections or even erirace. This l know to be absolutely false, os I observed these objects nets only throurh the rlass of my airplane but turned my rirplano sidevins whore I coulc open my window and observe them rit! a completely unnbstructad view. ('ithout sun plasses)
fiven thouth two nimutes seems like n very short time to one on the rround, in the eir in ti:e minutes time pilot orn observe great many thinfs and anythine within tife sirht of vision orobably as many as fifty or sixty times.

I continued my seerch for the marime plane for anothor fifteen or twenty mirutes ard while rearcinime for this tnerine plpne, what 1 had just observed k pht foin; throug ry rind. I bocenk moro disturbod, so after telfine a lest look nt Tieton fuservoir 1 lieaded for Yakima.

 coule even follow by the ir "lasies m; they rassed ;'t. Adams, was around two and nun-half or three minutes - althouch, by the time thoy reached lit. Adams thny were out of ny renfe of vision rs fer as determining shape or form. of coursc, whe: 'hr sm reflucted from on or two or three of these units, they eppeared to be cermletely round; but, I am fainc; a drevine to the best of my ability, wheh I fincluding, as to the shere I cbserved these objeots to be as thoy passed the show covered ridges as well as 'it. fininier.

Hen these objects mere rlyimf approximately strpight and level, they were just a black thin line and when they flipped was the only time 1 could set a juderont as to their size.

These objects were holdinr an alnost constrat elovation; they did not seen to be goin; up or to be conin!, cown, such es would be the cese of rockets or artiller; shells. I m . convinoed in my ovm mind thr they were some type of airplane, oven thourh thev didn't conform with the many aspects of the conventional type of planos that $I$ knov.

Althourh ti:ese objocts have hoen reported by many other observers throushout the United itates, ther. heve been six or scven other accounts written by some of the $3 e$ observers thot $I$ can trithfully sey must heve ob-

 tive enrineer in Illinois, plus of United Air Lines.

Soms descriptions could not be ver: accurate talten from the ground unless these snucer-like disks ware at quite a rreat heirht and there is a possiblity thet all of the peofle who observed peculiar obiects could have seen the same thing I did; but, it would have been ver; difficult fron the ground to observe these for more then four or five seconds, and there is alweys the possibility of atmospheric moisture and dust near the ground which could distort one's vision.

I hnve in my nossession letters frm all over the Intted States and people who profess thrt there objects have been cbserved over other portions of the world, principelly Sweder, Зermuct, and California.

I woulr heve rivcr almost anythin: thet dey to hnve had movie ermer with, telephoto lens end from new on 1 will never be without one - but, to continue further with my story. ihon I ifrided at, the Yakima, fiash., ajrport 1 dercribed rhnt 1 hed scet to ry very pood friend, Al Baxter, who listensd patiertly and we: ver: courteons but in a jokinr, wey didn't believe me.

I did not accurntely meriure the diftance/tieen these two mountains until I lrided at Pindletor, Oreron, tirfi; sero deve where I told n muber of pilot fricnds of mine wiet I had observe and they did not scoff or laugh but
